### Pastor's Message

"Giving Up" For Lent

We find ourselves in the heart of the Forty Days of Lent, with all the changes that the season brings. The paraments on the altar and the banner that hangs in our chancel are purple; we sing some different hymns, and there are parts of our liturgy we don't use and a certain word that we don't say (which begins with the letter "A"). Lent is a time when it is common for people to abstain from certain things. "What did you give up for Lent?" is the often-asked question, and the answers vary. For some, it's foods, like meat on Fridays, or chocolate, or coffee, or alcohol. Others give up activities or conveniences, things such as social media, and smartphones, and tablets (or, at the very least, giving up some of the time normally spent on them). Then there are people who give up certain "vices," shall we say, during Lent – things they know they shouldn't really be doing. My own household has had a bit of experience when it comes to giving up things this Lenten Sea-

As Ash Wednesday approached this year, we sought to give up the possessions that we did not want to move with us from Bloomfield, New Jersey to our new congregation, our new home, in Cheshire, Connecticut. Some things we gave up to friends and acquaintances and family, finding new homes for possessions that had been ours. Other things we gave up to the people from the town Department of Public Works, as they collected boxes of recycling and bags of things we threw away. When the time of the move came, there were still things that we wanted to give up, and that we will continue to give up, in the weeks and months ahead. But,

really, all of that is not what people have in mind when they ask, "What did you give up for Lent?"

How about you, "What did you give up for Lent?" Was it a food you could live without, a vice you should be avoiding anyway, or maybe an activity that was taking up time that should have actually been spent on other pursuits? All too often, the answer to

"What did you give up for Lent?" is something that we really could, or really should, be living without. We give up things that are not as difficult as we might think or feel, things that we actually can give up by sheer force of will or by sheer determination. What each of us really needs to be giving up for Lent is not food, or convenience, or vice, but sin – the sins that weigh us down and which make the repentance of the Lenten Season so necessary.

This Lent, give up anger and frustration, give up envy and avarice, give up fear and doubt and worry. Give up jealousy and pettiness, give up criticizing and condemning, give up judging and gossiping. There are so many things that we ought to give up for Lent – not just for Lent, but for always. It sounds so nice, it sounds so noble, it sounds so Christian, and it sounds so impossible. It sounds impossible because it is impossible. Our entire lives are spent trying to give up the sins to which our fallen human nature is drawn; we struggle to give up all the temptations into which the devil, the world, and our sinful flesh would lead us. The frustrating



While our Call Committee members diligently worked to seek candidates that they trusted and prayed would be the "right fit" for CLC, Pastor Rowold also had to evaluate, trust and pray that CLC would be the "right fit" for him and his family. So, as we have Called and In-Shepherd leads stalled him as our new Shepherd, let's all strive to make Pastor Rowold feel, in accepting our Call with the Lord's guidance, that he has come CLC traditions to the right place. truth is, so often we fail to give them up. That's why week after week, when we confess our sins during those moments of silence at the beginning of the Divine Service, we end up confessing the same sins time and time again.

That is also why Christ Jesus gave up everything, not for Lent, but for you – YOU. He gave up His heavenly throne, laying aside all the power and glory that was His as the only-begotten Son of God for YOU. He gave up His mother and family, His friends and His followers for YOU. He gave up His humility and His honor, His health and even His very life, for YOU. Our Lord Jesus gave up literally everything for YOU – to buy you back from sin, death, and the devil, to rescue you from the threatening perils of your sins. All that we cannot give up, all the sins and trespasses and iniquities, Christ Jesus takes from you and carries it Himself to His cross; all that belonged to Christ – His holiness, His righteousness, His life – He freely gives it up to you, giving it to you by His Word and Sacrament in the Divine Service.

This Lenten Season, DO give up something for Lent. Give up trying to please God all by yourself. Give up the anxiety or the worry that you do not measure up. Give up the fear or the doubt or the anger that keeps you from His house. Give up anything and everything that is preventing you hearing God's Word and from receiving His Sacraments. Christ Jesus is ready and waiting to give His forgiveness, His life, His salvation as a free gift – all that is missing is YOU.

First, I know I speak for myself and my colleagues on our CALL COMMITTEE when I attempt to express how honored we are for being chosen to serve, and how grateful we are for the trust and confidence shown to us throughout our search to recommend a pastor to serve and lead God's saints at CLC.

As I reflect on the makeup of our committee I am reminded that, from my point of view, it was a group guided by the Holy Spirit which brought commitment, expertise, knowledge and spirituality to the task. We were a blend of energy, thoughtfulness, caring, wisdom and seriousness, however, we allowed ourselves to demonstrate a sense of humor when called for.


Second, I want to commend the Call Committee formed on February 14, 1994. That committee included Priscilla Mulvaney Hilton Roth, Carolyn Bammann, Kurt Lenz, Kristen Donewald, Roy Walls and Paula Pierson. That group left behind a file of documents, surveys, letters and notes that were extremely helpful to the 2017 committee. They did so without the benefit of the technology and technical expertise enjoyed by the 2017 committee.

It is important to note that the protocol suggests three to five recommendations be provided to the congregation indicating the number one choice, the number two choice—and so on. From those selections the number one pastor is to be called. If that pastor declines, the protocol clearly dictates the Call Committee shall not automatically move to call the second choice—but to, "go back to the drawing board," review previously submitted PIFs and SETS, and seek additional PIFs and SETs.

The process noted above thankfully brought the Rev. Doctor David Rowold to our attention as his PIF and SET were not included in the initial submissions received by our committee in February 2017.

Our final message in the April edition of the HH just might be entitled—DELIVERANCE!!!



We thank all for their support and especially thank those who leave large bills in the box.



### NEWS FROM OUR STEWARDSHIP DEACON...

Thank you again for getting the Mission Plan off to a good start this year. Normally, my articles focus on pledging and contributions. This month I want to discuss another potential source of revenue. This one is essentially **free money**.

I am talking about **Thrivent Choice Dollars**. Many of you have accounts with Thrivent Financial. If you do, you should be eligible for Thrivent Choice Dollars. This is a program run by Thrivent whereby Thrivent members can direct where Thrivent's charitable outreach funds go. Cheshire Lutheran Church is an eligible organization to receive these funds. 

### THRIVENT CONGREGATIONAL ADVOCATE UPDATE...

Thrivent Financial believes that all we have is a gift from God and generosity is an expression of faith. Thrivent offers members many opportunities to "Live Generously" including the Choice Dollar Program and the Action Team Program.

Through the Thrivent **Choice Dollar Program**, eligible Thrivent members are designated charitable grant funds which they can direct among thousands of nonprofit organizations, including congregations. Please keep in mind that Good Friday falls on March 30 this year and Thrivent will be closed. In addition, Thrivent will be closed Saturday, March 31. It is therefore recommended that Choice Dollars be directed by mid-March to avoid missing the deadline.

# **Birthright** International

Birthright is a non-profit charitable organization that has been providing love and support for over 45 years to women facing unplanned pregnancies. We have chapters across Canada, the United States, and Africa, as well as a 24/7 North American toll-free Helpline. Birthright is supported by devoted volunteers and private donations.

### Love and Affection

Many Birthright volunteers and clients feel a special affection for Louise Summerhill- an ordinary woman who did something extraordinary to help others. Events in her own life helped her understand the feelings pregnant girls might experience, including feelings of loneliness, fear of criticism, tension with parents, and even the shock of finding oneself unexpectedly pregnant.



### **Humble Beginning**

Birthright began very humbly in 1968, with a one-room office and only \$300 in the bank. But Louise's steady leadership and powerful vision ensured that the new pregnancy service survived. In later years, Louise was glad the organization did not begin with a lot of money because it caused Birthright to rely on the "good hearts and hard work of volunteers". Over forty-five years later, Birthright International remains true to Louise's original vision of personal, one-on-one contact in helping relationships. Louise's Birthright means "approachability and informality" for clients and volunteers, instead of bureaucracy and meetings in highly structured, business-like environments.



### A Different, more Universal Approach

Birthright takes a non-moralistic, non-judgmental approach toward helping women through their pregnancy dilemmas. Louise regretted the fact that some young unmarried mothers were belittled or ostracized by their relatives: "I can never see anything wrong with any of them." At Birthright, Louise recreated the supportive homelike environment they deserved. Moreover, Louise helped formulate a Charter, followed by all Birthright chapters worldwide, to define Birthright's services, to ensure that pregnant women receive the same considerate treatment at every Birthright chapter, and to help volunteers preserve Birthright's good reputation in the future.



### Louise Summerhill's Legacy

On her death, three of Louise's daughters assumed the Co-presidency of Birthright International. Mary Berney, Stephenie Fox and Louise R. Summerhill served as CoPresidents until 2017, when Mary retired from Birthright after over 30 years of dedicated serivce. Stephenie and Louise remain as CoPresidents of Birthright International, Stephenie Fox, a CPA, oversees financial matters, while Louise R. Summerhill, a practicing lawyer, who provides legal support as needed. Stephenie and Louise are committed to their mother's vision of Birthright and to ensuring that her legacy lives on as long as Birthright is needed. Louise Sr.'s legacy has also taken hold in her family's next generation: her granddaughter, Victoria Summerhill Fox, works in the Birthright International head office. This multi-generational legacy plays itself out in Birthright chapters all over the world!

Birthright operates nearly 300 chapters across Canada, the United States and in Africa. We also have a 24/7 toll-free Helpline, so help is always nearby. 
