Pastor's Message

I was in conversation the other day and the topic fession. In other words, the reason for conof private confession came up among those who confess the Christian faith. The issue at hand was a simple misunderstanding concerning private confession and the Lutheran Church. The misunderstanding centered upon the belief that the Lutheran Church does not use private confession like the Roman Catholic Church. Now while there may be some truth to this the reality is that the Lutheran Church does have room for a practice of private or individual confession.

If one were to look in our hymnal there is an order for individual confession in it that is based upon Martin Luther's words from part V of the Small Catechism. Yet, even without a special order in our hymnal Lutherans have always had the opportunity to come to the pastor to confess sin individually and to receive the consoling words of absolution or forgiveness from the pastor. However, within the Lutheran Church most of the members follow the use and order of a general confession. This general confession is used to allow individuals to acknowledge the power of sin in one's life. It does so without the need to enumerate specific sins although one could take the time to consider whether or not there are specific sins one might like to acknowledge which are troubling an individual's heart. It is my practice in the church service during the confession to pause for a few moments before we make the general confession so that individuals who would like to consider particular sins might have the time to do so. This is proper and right because it is good practice to address things that we have done wrong and to acknowledge them so that we might make correction if possible. It is also good to acknowledge something that is troubling the conscience so that when the words of forgiveness are spoken the words can work to erase the concern.

This brings me to the words of absolution. Lutherans teach that absolution is the point of con-

fessing one's sins is to receive the blessing of forgiveness that was merited by Christ Jesus. Christians are to look at the Ten Commandments and discern if any were broken. (The 10 commandments, the Law, act like a mirror pointing out where we have fallen short). Christians do this not to be told to do something in order to bring about amends, but to be told something in order to be restored to a proper relationship to God . The something they are told is that God has forgiven them.

Luther would go as far as to say that when the words of absolution are spoken by the pastor in church, or privately, they are to be received as if they were spoken by Christ himself. This is not to be misunderstood so that the church is saying that the pastor is Christ but rather that the words he brings are the words of Jesus and the import of the words are valid.

> The words, "your sins are forgiven" are very powerful words. When they are accepted, as if from God himself, they free the individual from any guilt the individual may carry. Such freedom allows the person to live again and to arise to a new level of Christian living as the person is no longer burdened by the past, but released from it to live a new life. Indeed, the process of confession and forgiveness is the process of death andresurrection, a very Christian belief.

So, if you have a need to seek relief from sins that might plague you and you are seeking individual confession my door is always open for you. However, always know that there is forgiveness for sin. It has been merited by Christ Jesus and spoken to you by his servant, the pastor, so that your heart might be lightened from sin's burden and you might live in God's peace again. See you in church.







NEED TO GET INFORMATION TO CERTAIN MEMBERS OF OUR CONGREGATION?



J.P. and Aimee have two daughters — Celeste, born in March 2007, and Isabella, born in August 2009.



The concert will be part of our 60th anniversary celebration of Cheshire Lutheran Church as well as an opportunity for the community to join us for this special event at CLC.



The Thimble Islands Saxophone Quartet features a wide variety of music from Baroque to Contemporary. Their repertoire includes works from Chamber, Symphonic, Choral traditions as well as Jazz, Broadway and Rock. The saxophonists that make up the quartet have an average of 30 years of professional musical experience.

Frank Vasi, tenor saxophone, is an award winning composer and founder of the group. He graduated from Mannes College of Music in New York City. In the late 70's and 80's, Mr. Vasi performed in his own jazz ensemble and as a side man for jazz greats like Benny Goodman, Doc Cheatum and Joe Jones. Vasi's compositions have been performed at Lincoln Center, Alice Tully, and Avery Fisher Halls.

David Langlais, soprano saxophone, received degrees in Music Performance and Education from the University of Massachusetts and Bridgeport University. He is currently a music teacher in Branford, Connecticut.

Tim Moran, baritone saxophone, is a widely acclaimed, innovative jazz musician. He has performed in Europe, Japan, Canada, and throughout the United States. Mr. Moran works frequently in pit orchestras for national touring Broadway musicals. He has also performed with the New Haven Symphony and Orchestra of New England.

Will Cleary, alto saxophone, received his Bachelor of Music degree at Oberlin Conservatory and his Masters of Music from the Eastman School of Music. Mr. Cleary has performed with many notable jazz musicians such as Slide Hampton, Chuck Mangione, Marcus Belgrave, and Kim Waters. He has opened for Wynton Marsalis and the Jazz at Lincoln Center Orchestra. He has also played at jazz festivals throughout the United States.

This grant made it possible for us to purchase the backpacks and some additional items needed to reach our goal of 50 backpacks. This project concluded on Sunday, August 28th when kits were assembled by several members, young and old, following Sunday service. The next day the completed kits were delivered to the OGT warehouse in Terryville, CT. This was an amazing sight to see. The entire first floor of the warehouse is dedicated to the OGT. There volunteers sort and pack donations consisting of clothing, shoes, medical equipment, hospital beds, bikes, health kits, pillow case dresses and backpacks. They are packed into uniform boxes that are eventually loaded on a container and shipped to a needy location in the US or overseas.


