PASTOR'S MESSAGE

"Do not be alarmed. You seek Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has risen; he is not here." Mark 16:6 (ESV). These were the words that greeted Mary, Mary, and Salome when they arrived at the tomb early in the morning that first Easter. They were spoken by a young man in a white robe (an angel) who was sitting inside of the tomb.

"Alleluia! Christ is Risen! He is Risen Indeed! Alleluia!" These are the words that will greet you and your family when you arrive early in the morning this Easter. They will be spoken by a man in a white robe who is waiting inside. It is a tale of two Easters; they are similar to each other, but they are also so very different.

For starters, I will be standing when I greet you, and I am certainly no angel – a fact to which I believe my mother will emphatically attest. I am also not nearly as young as I was when I began in the ministry, though I am not nearly as old as my daughter believes. Though our first service may start earlier than it has for some time (services at 8:00 and 10:30, with Breakfast in between), it is not nearly as early as the sunrise time of the women. And, of course, we gather in a Church, not in a tomb – despite the somber looks on people's faces when we lament the folks who don't come to Church as often, or the busy schedules of our teens and young adults, or whatever other concern may present itself.

Still, in spite of the fact that it is over two thousand years later, on a different continent, and with all those other differences, the message of this Easter is the same as it was for Mary, Mary, and Salome – **HE HAS RISEN!** The tomb that was empty that first Easter morn still stands empty today, and Jesus Christ is still risen from the dead, lives and reigns to all eternity. This is most certainly true! (See the Explanation of the Second Article of the Creed in the Small Catechism for that attempt at humor.)

Sin, death, and the devil were conquered by Christ Jesus on the tree of the cross. Now we live in the knowledge that our sins are forgiven, we are made right with God, and everlasting life is ours – and that Good News changes us. You see, the Gospel is not a neutral thing. It does not just change hearts and minds; it changes lives too. If you keep reading chapter 16 of the Holy Gospel according to Saint Mark, the angel says to the women "But go, tell His disciples and Peter..." (Mark 16:7). The Gospel prompted action on the part of the women, and it prompts action from you and from me

too.

The Gospel calls us into Church week after week, throughout our lives, because it is there where our Lord feeds and nourishes us by Word and Sacrament. In His house He gives us the forgiveness, healing, restoration, and strength that we need so much. The Gospel also sends us out to go and tell to go out into the world, to our school or work, our grocery store or mall, and to tell people about our Lord and Savior through what we say and what we do. It is not always going to be overt acts of evangelism, but will often be sharing the love of God in Christ Jesus in simple, ordinary looking ways. The Good News also prompts us to bring others, to invite them to come with us into the Lord's house, so that they too can hear His Word and receive His forgiveness.

Unfortunately, all too often we respond like the women – fear and astonishment seized them and they said nothing, because they were afraid (Mark16:8). We keep that Good (*Continued on page 5*)

AND THE CHURCH COUNCIL

Our March 6th Church Council meeting was highlighted with Pastor Rowold's report of his first busy week here. He indicated his expectation to meet with all of our Deacons and Officers in the following weeks. Judy DiDomizio, Education Deacon, reported on the progress of the first Communion class and the Confirmation class, activities of our Little Cherubs Christian Preschool and our challenge with participation in youth Sunday School classes. Andy Clark, House & Grounds Deacon, spoke about upcoming projects in and around our church, including possible Eagle Scout projects. Brad Shick, Youth Deacon, reminded us of the National Youth Gathering in the summer of 2019 with some related FUNdraising activities for the congregation to look forward to.

The Council also deliberated the subject of our worship services schedule. Last spring, we adopted a 'one service' schedule, following Pastor Gustafson's retirement, so we would be able to consistently schedule visiting pastors to lead us in worship each Sunday. Great Blessings of that plan were (1) the several pastors who led us in worship each and every Sunday over the span of nine months and (2) the "coming together" of the congregation at one time over that period! An important factor in the Council's discussion was our need to rejuvenate our Sunday School attendance. After airing numerous "pros and cons" we have heard of the current one-service schedule and our previous twoservices schedule, the Council decided the following worship schedule for the next several months:

April 1st (Easter Sunday): two services – 8:00am and 10:30am with Easter Brunch between services

April 8^{th} – June 10^{th} : two services – $8{:}00am$ and $10{:}30am$ with Education hour between services

June 17th (Father's Day) – Sept 2nd (Labor Day): one service – 9:00am

A couple of Saturdays ago, on March 10th, Pastor Rowold, Steve Feero, David Veleber and Pat DiDomizio attended a New England District Ministry Conference – a gathering of pastors and lay leaders from across New England. The intent of the conference, including various break-out sessions, was for participants to receive coaching, encouragement and equipping the church for Word and Sacrament ministry. The Council is looking forward to their impressions, feedback and ideas from the conference for our ministries here.

Voters: Our next Voters meeting will be held, following the second service, on April 8th at 11:30am in our fellowship hall.

A MESSAGE FROM THE CALL COMMITTEE: **RECORD KEEPING AND DELIVERANCE OF A** PASTOR ...

I hope you had an opportunity to read the message submitted in the March Issue of the HH. This message will focus on advising you of our attempt to prepare and provide a record file of steps taken by the 2017 Call Committee and church leaders, similar to the record left by the 1994 Call Committee, and to reflect on the Rowold family's journey to Cheshire and CLC.

The record file will include instructions for CALLING A PASTOR as outlined in our CLC Constitution and Bylaws. The New England District of Lutheran Church - Missouri Synod provides a step by step process to follow during the search. That document will be included in the record file. In addition, the record file will include the step by step process our committee followed from being chosen to serve on the committee to the called pastor's formal installation service. There will be a Hard Copy (paper) file as well Electronic Files that will be kept in the Church Computer.

Former President Harry S. Truman, remember him, is quoted as saying: "You would be surprised what can be accomplished in our lifetime if it did not matter who gets the credit." I want to thank the countless number of people in our congregation who answered the call in ensuring "delivery" of the Reverend Doctor David P. Rowold and his family to CLC.

NEWS FROM OUR YOUTH DEACON...

Dear Parents of Teenagers,

Thank You for all you do to invest in the life of your teenager(s). You probably feel like an uber driver (ready to pick them up/drop them off when they call), coach (helping them perfect their sport), tutor (helping with them on homework), guidance Counselor (preparing them for the future) and, sometimes, a jockey (pushing them to cross the finish line...without a whip of course!)...all wrapped up in one! That's why, with all the insane busyness of parenting a teen, it's easy to let youth group attendance slide off the grid. It's tempting to think, "My kid's just too busy for a night of hanging out with other teenagers, playing some goofy games and hearing another Bible lesson."

Believe me when I say, I understand the temptation. As a parent of a wonderful daughter (who has tons of homework, takes Karate and is not yet old enough to drive) my fiancé and I are constantly under pressure to measure every event through the lenses of what matters most. We have decided that her continued Christian education outside of the weekly sermon is most important. Although we view ourselves as the primary spiritual influence of our daughter, we also believe that a strong youth ministry plays a vital role in her overall spiritual development.

With this as a backdrop here are 5 short, yet powerful, reasons you should encourage (make?) your teenager(s) go to youth group:

1. Teenagers need models and mentors.

"O God, You have taught me from my youth, And I still declare Your wondrous deeds. And even when I am old and gray, O God, do not forsake me, Until I declare Your strength to this generation, Your power to all who are to come. " Psalm 71:17,18

Of course you as a parent are called to be the primary spiritual mentor of your own children but he/she also needs other Godly adults! It's important for your son or daughter to see that this whole "Christianity thing" is more than just mom's and dad's belief system. They need to have models and mentors that reinforce all of the spiritual truth they are learning from you.

2. Teenagers need community.

"And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another—and all the more as you see the Day approaching." Hebrews 10:24,25

In an age of bullying, gossip, slander and hatefulness (which can destroy a teenager's selfidentity), young people need other young people who can lift them up, encourage them and challenge them in all the right ways. Youth group is also a place where teenagers can discover their spiritual gifting and begin to use it to serve others. This will help them have a heart to selflessly serve others for the rest of their lives!

3. Teenagers need a mission.

When Jesus challenged his most-likely teenaged disciples to "go and make disciples of all nations", he was tapping into the activist wiring of these young men. In the same way your teenager needs to be challenged with the mission to reach their peers with the good news of Jesus in a loving and contagious way.

Youth group is a place where your teenager can invite their unbelieving friends to hear the gospel. But it's also a place where they can be equipped to share the good news of Jesus with their own peers (which will help them grow in their faith!) As your youth leaders continue to build a Gospel Promoting ministry the message of Jesus will advance in them and through them. These activities will accelerate the discipleship process in the life of your teen in ways you could never imagine!

4. Teenagers need theology.

"Then we will no longer be immature like children. We won't be tossed and blown about by every wind of new teaching. We will not be influenced when people try to trick us with lies so clever they sound like the truth. Instead, we will speak the truth in love, growing in every way more and more like Christ, who is the head of his body, the church." Ephesians 4:14,15

Youth group is a place where teenagers can wrestle through the theology you've been teaching them (you've been teaching them right?) and have it reinforced in a powerful and personal way under the guidance of a youth leader who knows how to ask great questions and point teens to sound truth.

This should result in your teenagers knowing and owning their faith on a deeper level. Youth groups and small groups should be a place where teenagers can ask tough questions and even share doubts and struggles with their beliefs without fear of rebuke. Skilled youth leaders can take questioning teens back to God's Word as the source of authority and help them process through all of the Biblical truth you are praying they grasp, Believe and live out.

Great youth groups build on the foundation that Godly moms and dads have laid. And, for those teenagers who don't have believing parents, an effective youth ministry helps lay a solid foundation of Biblical truth for the rest of a teenager's life.

5. Teenagers need a safe place to confess and confide.

"Confess your sins to each other and pray for each other so that you may be healed." James 5:16

Often teenagers who struggle with sin and temptation have nowhere to confess and confide. They feel trapped by their sins. But a healthy youth ministry can create a safe space for teenagers to open up and talk honestly about their struggles. Of course this doesn't mean they should confess every sin to everyone. But it does mean that they should have a handful of others who know their struggles and can pray for and encourage them to walk in victory over those sins.

I often overhear my daughter confiding in adults she trusts outside the household. As we as parents often enforce rules and guidelines upon our children, it can be hard for our children to confide in us as they fear there will be consequences. For the parents reading this, I challenge you to look back at your youth and think of a time where you were scared to confide in your own parents.

An effective youth ministry can help teenagers deal with these challenges now and prepare them to be victorious both now and later.

Food for Thought?

Yes, I know that teen life is busy. But it would be a shame if our teenagers graduated from high school and were catapulted into "the real world" without every opportunity to know, live, share and own their faith in Jesus Christ.

At the end of the day, our teenagers embracing and embodying the Christian faith is more important than sports and more important than academics. Getting them involved in a healthy, vibrant youth ministry is worth fitting into a crazy, busy schedule. And if it's not quite as healthy as you think it should be then why don't you volunteer and make it better?

There's too much at stake for us to get this wrong. So let's get it right!

- → Each of you and every one of you, the members of Cheshire Lutheran Church for blessing us by Calling me to be your Pastor, for the warm and loving welcome that you have extended to us as we make our home here, for your willingness to wear name tags the first few weeks to help me learn names faster (and on which I am still working), and for all of your support and encouragement as I come to know you and the family of faith that is Cheshire Lutheran Church.

I know that there are more people to thank, whose actions of which I am not aware or whom I have accidentally omitted. Please pardon me if your efforts have not been fully acknowledged here. Each and every day I continue to learn more about the congregation that I am blessed to serve, and about the many and various ways that each and every one of you works to serve the Lord and care for this amazing parish and her members. Thank you all for everything that you have done and that you continue to do. Thank you for being the people that you are and for serving the Lord who called you in Holy Baptism. We look forward to getting to know you all better and, of course, to seeing you in Church.

THRIVENT CONGREGATIONAL ADVOCATE UPDATE...

Over the past few years, there have been many discussions about the Thrivent Action Team program. This program enables you to make a difference within our congregation as well as the community. With this in mind, it is worthwhile to provide an "in depth" explanation on how the program works in order to take advantage of the many opportunities it offers. The accompanying diagram outlines the program procedures as well.

You first identify a need, decide on a plan of action to help meet that need and pull together a group of volunteers to help (they do not have to be Thrivent members). You then apply on-line to lead your team in a one-time fund raiser, service activity or educational event. Once your activity is approved, you will receive your Thrivent Action Kit which will include:

A Banner to publicize the event; Invitations and Thank you cards; Thrivent Action Team T-Shirts A \$250 Community Impact Card

The \$250 is to be used as seed money to start the activity - the aim is to use the funds for supplies, tools, food, equipment or seed money for a fund raiser. The funds are not to be treated

as a grant. If you are a Thrivent Benefit Member, you qualify to lead 2 Action Teams per calendar year, each valued at \$250. If you are a Thrivent Associate Member, you qualify to lead 1 Action Team per year with a maximum of 3.

A simple-on line report is completed at the end of the project. You must complete one Action Team activity before you can apply for another. Also, only one approval and Community Impact Card is given per project.

The Action Team program is an excellent resource for enhancing outreach of our congregation, meeting a specific congregational need or providing funds for community or individual needs. Action Teams can also support neighborhood projects, club projects, school projects, co-workers needs, teen projects, educational sessions, etc.

I ask that you think about areas you can impact through this program. You may also want to consider asking one of our Church Council members if there is a specific need within their area. Shortly, there will be a "Wish List" posted on the bulletin board with specific projects that Thrivent members may sign up to sponsor. In the meantime, I am available to help in any way possible.

Birthright

Birthright is a non-profit charitable organization that has been providing love and support for over 45 years to women facing unplanned pregnancies. We have chapters across Canada, the United States, and Africa, as well as a 24/7 North American toll-free Helpline. Birthright is supported by devoted volunteers and private donations.

Love and Affection

Many Birthright volunteers and clients feel a special affection for Louise Summerhill- an ordinary woman who did something extraordinary to help others. Events in her own life helped her understand the feelings pregnant girls might experience, including feelings of loneliness, fear of criticism, tension with parents, and even the shock of finding oneself unexpectedly pregnant.

Humble Beginning

Birthright began very humbly in 1968, with a one-room office and only \$300 in the bank. But Louise's steady leadership and powerful vision ensured that the new pregnancy service survived. In later years, Louise was glad the organization did not begin with a lot of money because it caused Birthright to rely on the "good hearts and hard work of volunteers". Over forty-five years later, Birthright International remains true to Louise's original vision of personal, one-on-one contact in helping relationships. Louise's Birthright means "approachability and informality" for clients and volunteers, instead of bureaucracy and meetings in highly structured, business-like environments.

A Different, more Universal Approach

Birthright takes a non-moralistic, non-judgmental approach toward helping women through their pregnancy dilemmas. Louise regretted the fact that some young unmarried mothers were belittled or ostracized by their relatives: "I can never see anything wrong with any of them." At Birthright, Louise recreated the supportive homelike environment they deserved. Moreover, Louise helped formulate a Charter, followed by all Birthright chapters worldwide, to define Birthright's services, to ensure that pregnant women receive the same considerate treatment at every Birthright chapter, and to help volunteers preserve Birthright's good reputation in the future.

Louise Summerhill's Legacy

On her death, three of Louise's daughters assumed the Co-presidency of Birthright International. Mary Berney, Stephenie Fox and Louise R. Summerhill served as CoPresidents until 2017, when Mary retired from Birthright after over 30 years of dedicated serivce. Stephenie and Louise remain as CoPresidents of Birthright International, Stephenie Fox, a CPA, oversees financial matters, while Louise R. Summerhill, a practicing lawyer, who provides legal support as needed. Stephenie and Louise are committed to their mother's vision of Birthright and to ensuring that her legacy lives on as long as Birthright is needed. Louise Sr.'s legacy has also taken hold in her family's next generation: her granddaughter, Victoria Summerhill Fox, works in the Birthright International head office. This multi-generational legacy plays itself out in Birthright chapters all over the world!

Birthright operates nearly 300 chapters across Canada, the United States and in Africa. We also have a 24/7 toll-free Helpline, so help is always nearby.
