Council & Voters Meeting Reminder

Pastor's Message

"1 God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. ² Therefore we will not fear though the earth gives way, though the mountains be moved into the heart of the sea, ³ though its waters roar and foam, though the mountains tremble at its swelling." Psalm 46:1–3 (ESV)

The last year and a half has been a trying time for just about everyone. We've endured a global pandemic that has impacted nearly every aspect of the way we live our lives and which has brought a far-reaching economic downturn that has been felt far and wide. Just when things looked like they were finally improving – infection and hospitalization rates from the pandemic were down, prices were starting to decrease, and the availability of commodities was increasing – the situation took a turn for the worse.

The Delta variant of the Covid-19 virus began rapidly spreading, leading to increased infections and hospitalizations (especially among the young), virus precautions were increased, and the availability of certain items started to diminish. In addition to that, hurricane Henri made its way to New England and (as of the writing of this article) hurricane Ida is currently on track to hit Louisiana and other Gulf states. At the same time, the nation of Afghanistan has fallen to the Taliban following a rapid withdrawal of US military forces, and a terrorist attack outside the airport in Kabul took the lives of 13 US service members and left 13 more Gold Star families to grieve.

With all the ups and downs that have happened since the start of the pandemic – especially the downs - it's very easy for people to become tired, over-extended, worn out, and overwhelmed. I've had more than one person say to me, "I can't take much more of this." For many, there is almost a sense of dread when they check the headlines or watch the news, as they fear that

possibility that something else has gone wrong in our world, our nation, or our community.

At times like these, the worst thing that we can do is try to rely on ourselves; you and I just don't have it in us to persevere through all the challenges and difficulties that this life brings. Even working together and supporting each other, its still more than we can handle on our own. We have to look outside of ourselves for the strength we need; we have to turn to someone greater than any one of us for the strength and consolation to get through. We need God.

When life is getting to you, when things are overwhelming, go to God. He is greater than any problem or pain that this world may bring you; as the Psalmist puts it, He is your refuge and strength – He is your help in trouble. In the face of the most terrible things that could possibly happen in this life, you have nothing to fear, because you have God and God has you.

Almighty God claimed you as His child by water and the Word in the Sacrament of Holy Baptism. He grafted you into Christ Jesus, joining you together with His only-begotten Son forever. He continues to offer you His strength and consolation to bring you safely through all that this life brings, and He gives it as a free gift of His grace to all who are called by His name. It's there, ready and waiting for you in His Word and Sacraments; all you have to do is hold tight to the gift He freely gives in Christ Jesus.

Whatever this life may bring – even if the earth itself should crumble and be destroyed – there is nothing that you need to fear. God is with you and for you, to strengthen you and to preserve you. In His Son Jesus, He has conquered sin, death, and the devil for




FALL SERVICE SCHEDULE...


Beginning Sunday, September 12, 2020 we will be going back to our School-year schedule of two services on Sunday morning at 8 AM and 10:30 AM.

GETTING TO KNOW OUR MEMBERS...

CLC's featured members for September 2021 are Rita and Joe Stark. Rita was born in Hackensack, NJ and grew up in New York, while Joe was born and raised on Welfare Island, NY. Welfare Island no longer exists, it is now known as Roosevelt Island, NY.

Rita and Joe met on a blind date in New York City (NYC) on New Year's Eve. As Joe was preparing to leave for the Navy, he and his friends went out for one final night on New Year's Eve. His friend hooked him up with a date, who happened to be Rita. Joe enlisted in the Navy and spent 4 years on a destroyer until he was discharged in 1956. In 1954, Joe married Rita at Trinity Lutheran Church in the Bronx and they have been happily married for almost 67 years. They will celebrate their 67th anniversary on November 6.

The Starks spent their first 34 years together in Carmel, NY. Here they raised their family of 3 beautiful daughters. Their firstborn was Wendy, who is now 65. Next came Cindy, who is now 62. Lastly April, who is now 55, joined the Stark family through adoption. Later the couple relocated to Spring Hill, Florida where they spent 8 years. Since Wendy and Cindy ended up settling down in Connecticut, and April in New York, Rita and Joe found that a move to Cheshire would be the ideal location to stay close to their family. Before long, their family would grow to include 3 grandsons, Ryan, Peyton, and Nate and 1 granddaughter, Hannah...and they are expecting their first great-grandchild in October!

Rita spent her career working for the Insurance Company of North America in NYC and has enjoyed gardening as her favorite hobby. She grew both flowers and vegetables and enjoyed canning her harvests. Rita dedicated many years to volunteer work as well. She was a member of the Stephen's Ministry in New York, where she served Communion to shut-ins in their homes. She also volunteered in hospitals and provided homecare over her years in New York because of her passion for helping others.

Joe worked for Con Edison in NYC after serving in the Navy and he retired from there after 37 years. Joe lists both fishing and woodworking among his hobbies, along with coin collecting, crossword puzzles, and gardening. He proudly announced his last catch was a 36-pound striped bass that he caught out of Old Saybrook! Joe has made a couple of significant woodworking contributions to our church. He single-handedly built the wooden crèche nativity scene that adorns the front of our church at Christmas. He purchased the plans from a woodworking catalog and spent a whole year building it in his basement. Once built and transported to the church, a crew of church members led by Jim Mertz pitched in to help paint all the various pieces of the crèche. When Rita had the fundraising idea of selling greeting cards at church, Joe built the wooden card holder stand that we see in the entrance foyer. For many years Rita ran the card sales, which contributed ample funding to the church.

The couple has always enjoyed traveling and they both agree their most memorable trip was one to Germany and Switzerland. Rita's mother was from Augsburg, Germany and always told stories of her life there. Rita longed to go there some day to see the buildings her mother spoke of; the house she lived in, the church she attended, etc. Then for their 35th wedding anniversary, their daughters made this dream come true by gifting Rita and Joe with the trip of a lifetime. In Germany, both Rita and Joe had a great time visiting Rita's family homestead, church, and all the places Rita's mother had described. Another "outstandingly wonderful" trip for Rita was the visit to Israel that Joe sent her on with her friend. While there, she attended church services and received communion by the water.

It's no surprise that after growing up in NYC, both Rita and Joe are avid Yankees fans. They've attended countless games over the years, even many games in Florida while they lived there. Rita enjoys all kinds of music and cites Josh Groban as her favorite musical artist, while Joe likes country and western music. As for favorite books and movies, they enjoy reading the Bible and daily devotions and watching movies on the Hallmark Channel.

COVID -19 PRECAUTIONS REMINDER AND ATTENDANCE INFO...

As we enter into the Fall and activities resume at Church after the Summer hiatus, please remember that there are still some Covid precautions in place at CLC. With the rise in cases in our state and community caused by the Delta variant, we paused our process of gradually lifting the last of the practices we put in place to help keep everyone safe. We hope to be able to finally lift those last precautions, but the members of the Wellness & Safety Committee decided that we are not yet at the point we can do that.



We are still wearing masks inside the Church building. This is because we have members who are not yet vaccinated (most notably children aged 11 and under) and we have some who have compromised immune systems. It is also because we are not socially distancing inside or requiring people to sign up for Church in advance. We are not yet having the ushers collect the offering and bulletins are still available on the table in the narthex. Also, we continue to limit the number of people at the Communion rail at one time and have not resume using the common cup for the Sacrament. People are, however, allowed to share the greeting of peace in whatever way they are most comfortable.

If you have questions about any of our Covid precautions, please feel free to speak to Pastor Rowold or any of the members of the Wellness & Safety Committee. We look forward to the day when the committee can return its attention to the more mundane topics of fire safety, first aid classes, and the importance of not over-exerting yourself when shoveling snow. Until then, take care of yourself and stay healthy.



The following summer her--church work--was interrupted when she, eventually, decided to spend her life with me.

Judy and I met when we were 14 years old and became friends. As C.S. Lewis said, we were both God's patients. At first I admired her, at age 18, I fell in love with her. She was the most honest person I have ever known.

I noted the word interrupted above, regarding her calling for church work, because, as you know she carried on with church work here at CLC. In addition she, as she did everything, quietly changed my life and certainly made me a better person. The latter was accomplished in many ways, but most importantly by, beginning in 1964, slowly, gently leading me to CLC and a family of brothers and sisters I will cherish for the rest of my life.

It started with suggestions from church leaders such as the Clarks, Roths, Dalys and Bammanns to participate in Spring and Fall clean up, cutting down and delivering the Christmas tree, then maybe be an usher and on and on, resulting in the guidance and friendship of five pastors, the people named above and so many others.

News from The House & Grounds Deacon...

Greetings fellow members and friends of Cheshire Lutheran Church,



I am reaching out to you all as the head of the streaming committee to give you an update on our progress and ask for your support. At the last voters meeting, I presented two vendors for the streaming service, HB Communication and Power Sound of New England. I also presented an overview of the proposal each vendor submitted and, after much discussion, the voters agreed to let the streaming committee meet and choose a vendor based on voter feedback. In early June, the committee met and chose HB Communication as the vendor of choice due to their customization, reputation and local support. We then reached out to HB and had a meeting at the church where we went over our needs again and finalized the details of the project.

The final cost for all the work is a little over \$22,000. I believe when we first began talking about this project I gave the rough estimate of \$20,000 - \$25,000 and this cost falls right in the middle of that estimate. The committee and I feel that this solution will solve our immediate needs for better quality streaming and gives us flexibility for future enhancements.

To move forward, we have put down 40% or approximately \$9,000. We have had several members reach out indicating they would like to contribute to this project and I would like to reach out to anyone else that would like to help. Within the next few weeks, I expect HB to start the installation and, upon completion, the remaining balance will be due. I would like to ask for your financial support, or so we can be ready when this most welcomed upgrade is ready. Checks can be made out to the church with a note indicating funds should be directed to the streaming service.

On behalf of the streaming committee, I want to thank you, not only for your donations, but for your support and encouragement. We are truly blessed to have such talented and knowledgeable people in the congregation that allow us to spread His word both in person and remotely now. Thank you again.




UPDATE: 2021 School Kit Project Orphan Grain Train School Kits:

THE RIPPEL REPORT—SEPTEMBER 2021..

In Memoriam September 11, 2001 – Reflections September 2021

Twenty years have elapsed since the events of that fateful day shocked our nation, dramatically changed world history and plunged our nation into a major war against insidious terrorism.

Many calendar dates need no explanation, December 7, 1941, June 6, 1944, etc. 9/11/2001 has joined these memorable dates.

Average Americans remember instantly where they were, what they were engaged in at that time and who they were with when they witnessed, or heard, or watched momentous events unfold. For myself, I was at Gardner Heights Shelton CT. There is an assisted living rehab facility; my mother was a resident there. I was in the Directors office discussing my mothers progress. The 2 adjoining offices of Director Maggie Buchnell had 2 television sets focused on the twin towers, The World Trade Center. New York City's testament to the world, a symbol of both freedom and worldwide commerce.

As several office personnel and I watched in horror as each step of this tragedy took place, office help responded with groans, sobs, and curses.

By days end, verified facts were made known over world news agencies; initially thought to be a catastrophic accident, this dismissed and labeled as a deliberate terrorist attack on our Nation. The mastermind of this entire horrendous plot was a wealthy Islamist fanatic by the name of Osama bin Laden. He would finance, recruit and train like minded fanatics in this mission of wholesale destruction against our Nation. There would be as many as 3 dozen men in this suicide plot. In the early morning hours of September 11, 2001, they would board 4 commercial passenger air liners at Boston's Logan airport. In mid-flight they would draw weapons on passengers and crew, storm the 4 cockpits and hijack 4 aircraft; directing the crews, and even piloting some aircraft, they completed their devastating mission. Their orders and intent were specific, to destroy the symbols of freedom and world trade, the Twin Towers of the World Trade Center. Next, to destroy the symbol of our Nation's military strength, The Pentagon in Washington DC. Finally to destroy the symbol of US Government, law and order, our Nation's Capitol. During the last attempt, brave Americans, the passengers fought with the hijackers and deliberately forced the plan to crash in Shanksville, PA. Mission never accomplished.

Weeks later, during Federal hearings regarding the summary of all that became a permanent historic event, it was revealed that, in Miami, Florida ,1 week prior to these massive and destructive acts, a group of these future hijackers were in a Miami bar, toasting each other on their plans. The more they drank, the looser their tongues became; they were overheard to boast that the streets of NY City would run red with the blood of Americans. The bartender and several patrons heard each boastful comment and did not report any of these comments to the FBI Agency or proper authorities.

Looking back at this crucial fact, just imagine how this heartbreaking National tragedy may have been avoided.


There were additional concerns at that site of the Twin Towers, during recovery and momentous material removal; the western wall of the excavation was found to be unstable and in danger of collapse. Had this occurred, trillions of gallons of the Hudson River waters would have flowed unstoppable and completely submerged the island of Manhattan.

In conclusion, President George Bush stood in the rubble of the World Trade Center surrounded by rescue teams and megaphone in hand, broadcast to the world a strong, "We Americans have heard from you, and you shall hear from us". The war against the forces of evil and terrorism had begun. The war would last for nearly 20 years, ending in the total defeat of each individual responsible for the 9/11 events.




Bible Studies at CLC
