#### Pastor's Message

"Now the birth of Jesus Christ took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been betrothed to Joseph, before they came together, she was found to be with child from the Holy Spirit. And her husband Joseph, being a just man and unwilling to put her to shame, resolved to divorce her quietly. But as he considered these things, behold, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream ... When Joseph woke from sleep, he did as the angel of the Lord commanded him: he took his wife, but knew her not until she had given birth to a son. And he called his name Jesus." (Matthew 1:18–20a, 24-25 ESV)

When we think of Christmas, there are certain images of our church and our homes that come to mind. There's the Advent wreath and the Christmas tree, the candles that light up our bulletins during the late service and the evergreen wreathes hanging on the walls, the poinsettias and the

creche, the table set with Christmas dinner and we can't forget the presents. These things are all so common, so much a part of our celebration of our Savior's birth, that we expect to see them at Christmas time; when we don't see these things, we notice their absence, and it can even leave us feeling that something is wrong.

In much the same way, there are certain things that we expect to hear when the Christmas Gospel is read. There's supposed to be Mary and Joseph in the stable with baby Jesus in the manger, and maybe a donkey and an ox nearby. There needs to be shepherds out in the fields with their flocks and hosts of angels saying "Glory to God in the Highest." (Yes, "saying" glory to God, not singing; Luke records that they said the words.) Eventually the shepherds make their way to the stable to see the Christ-Child and share with Mary and Joseph the news of what they saw. The Christmas Gospel without these things just doesn't feel like the Christmas

Gospel; something is missing and we know it. Without them it feels odd and strangely wrong.

Matthew's version of the Christmas Gospel is just such an account. There's no mention of the trip to Bethlehem, the manger, the shepherds, or the angel hosts. All we get is a vision of one angel before the birth, and we don't even get Mary's name when she gives birth to the baby Jesus. It's short, abrupt even, lacking in all the expected details and participants, and it just somehow feels wrong. It's not like the Christmas Gospel at all. There's no "Glory to God in the highest," just "he took his wife, but knew her not until she had given birth to a son. And he

called his name Jesus." That's not what the Christmas Gospel is supposed to be.

For many people, Christmas last year
was a similar
experience –

it was not what it was supposed to be.

2020's "Covid Christmas" meant that families gathered around the screen much more frequently than they gathered around the tree or the table. Gifts were exchanged via porch drops and common carriers like USPS, UPS, and Fedex, instead of while sitting together around the tree. Excited children tearing into wrapped packaged was often replaced with letting them sit in a garage or an entryway for a day or two before being deemed "safe" to be brought inside. The Christmas dinner table, so often shared, looked more like "Meals-on-Wheels", as boxes of food that could easily be mistake for takeout or a purchase from the local supermarket's hotfood bar were delivered to those who dared to eat something that came from outside their

home.





last year were spared the impacts of the pandemic. Pews full of families with smiling faces were replaced with socially distanced households sporting face-covering masks. Instead of the music from a choir full of people up in the balcony, only the sound of a solo voice was to be heard. The candlelight part of the service was almost lost too, but for the grace of God and the generosity of a determined family who donated many candlesnuffers, so that people could extinguish their candles while still wearing their masks. For many, something just did not feel quite right; it was not what Christmas Eve service was supposed to be.

Matthew's Christmas Gospel does <u>not</u> sound like what we expect to hear. It <u>is</u> short, even abrupt, compared to Luke's account. It <u>does</u> lack the details and the participants that we've come to anticipate from the story. It may not be what we think it is supposed to be and it may even feel odd or strange, but none of that changes one important fact – it <u>IS</u> still the Christmas Gospel. It is <u>still</u> the Good News that the Son of God took on flesh and blood in the womb of the Virgin Mary, and that He was born for you and me to save us from our sins. The truth of what happened and the blessing that God gave is not changed, just because the words weren't what we expected to hear.



It's still too soon to know exactly what services will be like on Christmas Eve this year. In spite of all our hopes and prayers, it is highly unlikely that they will be exactly like we have come to expect from years past – like they were in 2019, 2018, and before. Some things may still seem strange, and be more evocative of last year's "Covid Christmas" than what we would like. None of that, however, will change the important facts.

On Christmas Eve this year, we <u>will</u> celebrate the Christ-Child's birth in Bethlehem all those centuries ago. We will gather around the altar to receive our Savior in His body and blood in the Sacrament. We will sing the Christmas hymns that we all know and love so well. The light of all those candles will fill the sanctuary with their warm glow as we sing "Silent Night" during the late service. And we <u>will</u> hear the words of the Christmas Gospel (from Luke's account), proclaiming the Good News of great joy that a Savior has been born unto us in the city of David.

I pray that I can expect to see you there too.

God bless you this Advent and Christmas season, and may our gracious God watch over and preserve you and all your loved ones.

#### GETTING TO KNOW OUR MEMBERS...

#### December 2021—Ken Leslie

CLC's featured member for December 2021 is Ken Leslie. Ken was born in Waterbury, CT on September 23, 1929, and had three siblings: two brothers and a sister. He grew up and went to school in Waterbury. After finishing school, he enjoyed working on a dairy farm before proudly entering the US Navy in 1946. The Navy sent him to Airmen's School in Memphis

where he graduated with High Honors! Next, he attended school in New Jersey, where he chose weather as his specialty before serving in Quonset Point, RI. He even traveled on an icebreaker to the North Pole, stopping at Halifax, Greenland, and Canada. Ken also served on an aircraft carrier, the U.S.S. Tarawa.

After three and a half years in the service, Ken was supposed to go to Vietnam, but instead had to leave and go home to help his blind father care for his mother, who was very sick at the time. When he came home, he wore his Navy uniform every time he went out since this was the custom in those days during the war. Ken remembered a girl he met in high school named Eleanor whom he liked, but unfortunately, at that time, the feeling wasn't mutual. One night a friend of his, who happened to be Eleanor's brother, invited him to go to a party and Eleanor was there. She took one look at him in his uniform and took quite a shine to him. Eleanor and Ken were married at St. John's Lutheran Church in Waterbury in 1952 and eventually joined Cheshire Lutheran Church because Eleanor's family were members.

Ken went back to work at a farm, the Maple Hill Dairy Farm, after his time in the service. One day a superior told him that he could do so much better at the power company, so he applied and got job driving a truck for \$1/hour. Soon after, he became a line helper, then advanced to a Main Line Foreman, and ended up working for the power company for 37 before retiring. Eleanor and Ken were not big travelers, but they enjoyed numerous trips to Cape Cod, which was a favorite getaway for them.



The happy couple added two sons, Ken Jr., and Scott, along with a daughter, Karyl, to their family. The Leslie family expanded to include six grandchildren and three great grandchildren. Ken is extremely proud of his family. Ken Jr. was an All-American swimmer and worked for Cigna until retirement. Karyl was a nurse and worked for the Visiting Nurses Association along with several other places prior to her retirement. Following in his father's footsteps, Scott worked for the power company prior to his passing away in 2019. Eleanor passed away in 2010.

As for hobbies and interests, Ken enjoys doing puzzles and is an avid fan of both UConn Girls Basketball and the Boston Red Sox. He really loves living at Arbor Rose in New Britain. Ken finds the people there to be very friendly and he has developed a 'best friend' friendship with Anne Duncan, who is a resident there.

Being that Ken is a Veteran, he was just presented with his Quilt of Valor and was both touched and honored by the gift. We thank you, Ken, for your service and are happy to have you as a member of our CLC family.





#### THE RIPPEL REPORT—DECEMBER 2021..

#### Oh, Christmas Tree

Can we as Christians maintain that special Christmas feeling beyond the dates on the calendar? Most certainly as a statement of faith and a positive attitude.

Christmas in the western world is celebrated by Christians for a 12-day period from December 25<sup>th</sup> through January 6<sup>th</sup>. Epiphany is celebrated on the 6<sup>th</sup> in western churches.

In the eastern religious world, Orthodox Christianity worships our Savior's birth on January 6<sup>th</sup> which is also referred to as "ittle Christmas".

The first 400 years of Christianity observed the Nativity scene on January 6<sup>th</sup>. It was out of necessity and self-preservation that the date was changed to December 25<sup>th</sup> by early church leaders and members.

Roman persecution took a severe toll on anyone who professed and practiced the Christian faith. Pagan worship of Romans to their sun god was held on December 25<sup>th</sup> each year. Christian leaders quickly seized this opportunity to celebrate the Christ Child's birth, safely mixing in with the pagan masses. This also offered an opportunity to recruit new members into the Church of Christ.

Epiphany represents may ideas of faith to various nationalities and denominations. To some it is the Savior's birth, or the adoration of the Kings, the light coming to the Gentiles, or the evidence and restating of the baptism, divinity, miracles, and teachings of our Lord.

The first time I heard the expression, "Little Christmas" was just 80 years ago growing up in New York City.

My best friend George and his family were devout Russian Orthodox Christians. When I heard two Christmas observances, I thought this was great; double the excitement, fun and gifts as well.

In the summer of "42", George's older brother Ernie joined the Navy right out of high school. His parents, naturalized citizens who had fled Russia, were very proud of their son enlisting in the armed forces. Ernie was assigned to the USS Alabama commissioned in the spring of 1943 and promptly sent to combat duty somewhere in the South Pacific.

The family eagerly awaited news month by month, especially when the family would be together for Christmas. Unfortunately, the war disrupted millions of Christmas plans and reunions that year.

This family did something very unusual that year. First, they celebrated traditional Christmas: worship, family dinner, live tree, decorations, and gifts. Only small personal gifts were exchanged. The larger, more meaningful presents would not be opened until their son came home for Christmas. Stranger yet was the family decisions to keep the live tree in place until Ernie's homecoming, whenever that would be.

The Christmas season was over, so was Lent. For two Easters the tree from Christmas remained. The green needles turned brown and had all fallen off the branches by this time. The Christmas gifts were unopened, a village scene placed on the white cotton base was blanketed by brown needles. The lights were disconnected months earlier for fear of fire. The branches drooped so badly, that ornaments had to be moved to a more secure locations, less they slide off the drooping branch ends. String was used to support badly sagging branches. Angel hair, the





spun glass tree decoration popular at that time, covered this pathetic looking Christmas tree like a ghostly shroud.

Memorial Day, Father's Day, 4th of July, the family Christmas remained on hold.

One day in mid-August, a phone call from Ernie at the Brooklyn Navy yard set the stage for one great Christmas celebration, even if it was eight months overdue.


#### Fatherhood Coach:


