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Pastor's Message

"O Lord, throughout these forty days You prayed and kept the fast; Inspire repentance for our sin, And free us from our past... Be with us through this season, Lord, And all our earthly days, That when the final Easter dawns, We join in heaven's praise." O Lord, Throughout These Forty Days (LSB 418, stanzas 1 & 4)

There are many joyful times in the annual cycle of feasts, festivals, and holy days that make up the Church Year. The season of Lent is definitely not one of those times. In stark contrast to seasons like Christmas and Easter, with their brightness and up-tempo hymns and white paraments, stands the season of Lent, with its darkness and slow hymns and purple paraments. Unlike the parts of the Church year that focus on happiness and hope, Lent is the time when our attention turns to sin and sadness and repentance. It is the one part of the Church year about which no one has ever said, "That's my favorite!" - at least not within my hearing.

The reason people don't like Lent is because it is not a fun or easy time. It is forty days that we spend focusing on just how much we fail to live up to God's standards. For centuries, it has been a time of self-sacrifice, abstaining, and depriving oneself. It has long been a common practice for people to give something up for Lent, usually a guilty pleasure of an often-enjoyed luxury. In the Roman Catholic Church, abstaining from meat on Friday's has been part of the Lenten routine for centuries. Of course, we can't forget about the additional religious observances – the midweek services, the Lenten devotionals, and all those services during Holy Week.

Lent is not a joyful or happy time. It is often tiring and trying; when it is observed faithfully, it can also be humbling and humiliating. To be honest with God and with ourselves about our personal sinfulness, faults, and failings is hard and unpleasant. In truth, there are times in

everyone's life when they wish they could just skip over the forty days of Lent with the hardship they bring and jump straight from Ash Wednesday to Palm Sunday, Holy Week, and Easter. Yet, in spite of all that is hard to deal with about the season of Lent, we still go through it each and every year.

We journey through those forty days of sin and difficulty that is Lent with our eyes fixed firmly on the other side, on Easter. We are able to endure the trying and tiring times because we know the joy that awaits us at the end. We are willing to experience the humbling and the hardship because we're looking ahead to the happiness and forgiveness that is ours after we pass through. The season of Lent is not fun, but we persevere as we march on toward our goal of Easter.

In many ways, the Lenten journey we travel together is a lot like your life.

There are times in your life when it is not fun or easy. It may bring you suffering or sickness or sadness. You may endure pain or hardship or loss. You'll experience doubt and fear, loneliness and longing. At times, you may even wish that you could just skip over it all and get straight to the end, but still we journey through it. We live our lives much like we go through the season of Lent, with our eyes fixed firmly on the other

We are able to endure all that this life brings – including the hardship – because we know who and what awaits us at the end. The final Easter, when all the saints are reunited around the throne, waits for you and me and all the faithful. The happy homecoming with all we have lost and with our Lord is the destination to which we journey through this life. And it's your Savior Jesus who will strengthen you and see you through to the



SINGING TOGETHER—A SIGNIFICANT SIGN OF OUR ONENESS...

A week or so ago I heard a fascinating lecture on the internet by Anton Armstrong, the conductor of the famed St Olaf Choir, based in Northfield, MN. One of the many points he made caught my particular attention – so much so that I want to share it with you, dear reader.

As he bemoaned the fact that we Americans seem to be sharply divided in so many matters, whether it be our political convictions, or whether or not to get vaccinated, or whether or not to wear masks, etc. etc. Dr Armstrong went on to point out that whenever we sing a song like "God Bless our Native Land" or a hymn like "Now Thank We All Our God", our divisive spirit melts away. When we sing the former, we're all just Americans, and when we sing the latter, we're all



just Christians. So it's obvious, he said! Singing binds us together in a way that we may or may not always be aware of. Hence, a staunch Republican may be in church standing along side a staunch Democrat; but when they're singing hymns (or confessing their faith), they're doing so not as adherents of a political party, but as disciples of Christ.

You, the reader, may want to remind me that Christians through the ages have not always behaved well, that they have even fought bitter wars with one another over differences in their religious beliefs. And I'm sorry to have to admit that you're right. But wouldn't you also agree that here in America our track record as Christians is a relatively healthy one. For example, we members of CLC would feel equally comfortable singing "Now Thank We All Our God" if we happened to be in Cheshire's Congregational Church or Cheshire Methodist Church or any other of our town's Christian houses of worship. And even though we would never be asked to sing that Christian hymn in our local Jewish Temple, we as Americans have all been taught to have the highest respect for our Jewish neighbors

or for people of any other faith. We may be divided in our religious convictions; but as fellow Americans in this year 2022 we still do value one another – and do always stand ready to be of help to one another as neighbors or fellow townsmen.

So you see – I began this brief article acknowledging that in some ways we Americans admittedly have a considerable amount of work to do in cultivating a healthy respect for one another in spite of the political or personal issues we differ about; but lest we be too hard on ourselves, there are other ways in which we do still think highly of one another. And that brings me back to where I began – namely, to call your attention to the fact that our singing of patriotic songs and Christian hymns has value over and above giving honor and glory to our nation and to our God. It also strengthens the tie that binds us together as Americans and, in our case here at CLC, as Christians. SO – would you not agree – that it is indeed helpful and healthy for us to KEEP ON SINGING!

GETTING TO KNOW OUR MEMBERS...

This month marks one year since the Evangelism Committee began running our feature article "Getting to Know Our Members." We hope you are enjoying the wonderful member stories that we share. Our featured member for March 2022 is Carolyn Bammann. Although she has been a member here at CLC for nearly 50 years, there may just be a few things you don't know about

Carolyn (Smith) was born in Aurora, Illinois in 1932 and raised in Ridgewood, New Jersey. Her dad was in banking and during this time many banks were closing due to the infamous stock market crash. This forced him to relocate the family to the New York City area, where he found new employment.

After graduating high school in New Jersey and attending Ohio Wesleyan University, Carolyn went to the Tobé-Coburn Business School. This was a two (2) year, all year long, program which prepared her for a career in fashion merchandising. Upon graduation from Tobé-Coburn Business School, she moved to the SoHo area of NYC and began her career at City Stores Mercantile. Here she handled keeping up to date on the latest fashion trends and selecting, buying, and selling fabrics for clothing stores across the country.

In the Summer of 1959, Carolyn met John Bammann, who hails from Queens, NY. John was Lutheran and Carolyn was Presbyterian. They both belonged to an Episcopal church outreach group in Manhattan that was for young single Christians looking to meet other young single Christians. They met each other, were engaged four (4) months later, and married shortly after at a Lutheran service in a private home in Greenwich, CT in 1960.

John proudly served our country in the Navy on a Destroyer in the Pacific. It was quite a harrowing experience for him to serve during World War II. John came out of his Naval service with a pharmacy degree and began his career at a pharmaceutical


company called Parke-Davis, which is now a subsidiary of Pfizer. Carolyn and John settled in Long Island, where they started their family with two (2) daughters who are well known to our CLC community, Eva (Schrumm) and Christine (Smith.) Ironi-

cally, Carolyn's maiden name was Smith, so when Christine married Paul Smith, it brought Carolyn's maiden name back into the family. Another Fun Fact: Eva married Jonathan Schrumm, whom she met at our CLC youth group when they were both young church goers.

Christine and Eva expanded Carolyn and John's family to include five (5) granddaughters and three (3) great granddaughters! Boys just were not in the cards for the Bammann family, but Carolyn and John truly welcomed the wonderful husbands their daughters chose into their family, as if they were their own sons.

What brought the Bammann Family to Cheshire, CT? John's pharmaceutical territory spanned the New York City area, but Carolyn wanted to raise the girls in a more suburban setting than the big city. She encouraged him to apply for a change of territory. He was able to take an opening in Connecticut, so they drove up to check out our

state searching for the perfect place to raise their family. Cheshire was it! They moved here in 1973 and Carolyn, her daughters, and granddaughters are all members of CLC. Not only were Eva and Christine both married here in our church, but all



appreciated visiting places like Gettysburg, PA and St. Augustine, FL because she likes to sense the value of what people went through to make our country what it is today. They traveled twice a year – one trip was to take the family to a lake cottage in Maine, while the other trip entailed a bus tour of a historical site across the US. Carolyn was most fond of Mount Rushmore and the awe-inspiring historical value of our past Presidents' faces carved in stone. John favored the trip to Gettysburg, which included visits to various battle fields, along with stories of the battles that took place in each.

Interests for Carolyn include reading, classical music, classic movies, baseball, and "anything that smacks of theater." She prefers to read historical novels, especially stories based on WWII and Old English history. Her favorite music genre is classical

with Chopin as a top choice, while she also likes big band music and jazz. She is entertained by Turner Classic movies and occasionally tunes into Netflix to view historical documentaries. Carolyn's dad grew up in Florida, where the Brooklyn Dodgers trained in the winter. Since his father had been a bat boy for them, he really took to baseball. He passed a love for the sport to Carolyn, who learned the game when she served as the scorekeeper for his twilight league. She lost interest in the Dodgers when they headed to Los Angeles and has been an avid fan of the Boston Red Sox ever since. As for theater, Carolyn took piano and dance lessons as a young girl and is a self-proclaimed "song and dance ham." She always jumped at any chance to "ham it up" on stage. She performed in countless local song and dance revues and drama clubs throughout NYC, including the St. Bart's Players.

Over the past 50 years of membership at CLC, Carolyn has been an extremely active volunteer. She belonged to both our Choir and Bell Choir, as well as served multiple times as President of the Women's Auxiliary. Carolyn learned the art of stained glass making when CLC member, Diddy Izard, started a women's group to teach them how to make stained glass. Carolyn was so delighted by her new skill that she formed her own business called *Carolyn's Glass Menagerie*, where she booked parties and traveled the state to display and sell her stained glass pieces. Her passion for crafting drove her to start the former CLC Craft Show and Bake Sale, together with Harriet Turkelson. The original fair featured only crafts for sale, but it grew so big that people had to wait in line to enter! It became a juried show where crafts needed to be entered and selected to curb the size of the event. Next, baked goods were added to the offerings. When Harriet moved away, Ellie Kenney came aboard and brought the addition of baking and selling apple pies. This later morphed into the Apple Pie Workshop, which we still enjoy today. In addition, Carolyn has served on numerous CLC committees including the Call Committee for Pastor Gustafson and the Building Committees for both the fellowship hall and preschool additions. Special thanks to Carolyn for all her dedicated service to our church.

Carolyn considers her daughters and their families to be her #1 priority and the cherry on top of her life. They have brought her so much joy with their husbands, children, and grandchildren, who continue to watch over her since John's passing in 2016. She is humbled by the compassion and kindness they continually show toward her. Being born an only child, her goal was to have a warm and loving family and she feels that the Lord listened and blessed her with the most wonderful family ever.




NEWS FROM THE FINANCIAL SECRETARY...


Reminders from Your Friendly Neighborhood Financial Secretary:


MARCH 2ND IS...ASH WEDNESDAY!

THE RIPPEL REPORT—DECEMBER 2021...



St. Patrick's Day

St. Patrick's Day, <u>feast</u> day (March 17) of <u>St. Patrick</u>, <u>patron saint</u> of <u>Ireland</u>. Born in <u>Roman Britain</u> in the late 4th century, he was kidnapped at the age of 16 and taken to Ireland as a slave. He escaped but returned about 432 CE to convert the Irish to <u>Christianity</u>. By the time of his death on March 17, 461, he had established monasteries, churches, and schools. Many <u>legends</u> grew up around him—for example, that he drove the snakes out of Ireland and used the <u>shamrock</u> to explain the <u>Trinity</u>. Ireland came to celebrate his day with religious services and feasts. Saint Patrick's Day is celebrated on Thursday, March 17, 2022.

It was emigrants, particularly to the United States, who transformed St. Patrick's Day into a largely secular holiday of revelry and celebration of things Irish. Cities with large numbers of Irish immigrants, who often wielded political power, staged the most extensive celebrations, which included elaborate parades. Boston held its first St. Patrick's Day parade in 1737, followed by New York City in 1762. Since 1962 Chicago has colored its river green to mark the holiday. (Although blue was the colour traditionally associated with St. Patrick, green is now commonly connected with the day.) Irish and non-Irish alike commonly participate in the "wearing of the green"—sporting an item of green clothing or a shamrock, the Irish national plant, in the lapel. Corned beef and cabbage are associated with the holiday, and even beer is sometimes dyed green to celebrate the day. Although some of these practices eventually were adopted by the Irish themselves, they did so largely for the benefit of tourists.

Legend says St. Patrick was actually born Maewyn Succat, but that he changed his name to Patricius (or Patrick), which derives from the Latin term for "father figure," after he became a priest. And that supposed luck of his is the root of all the themed merchandise for modern St. Patrick's Day.

Since the holiday falls during Lent, it provides Christians a day off from the prescriptions of abstinence leading up to Easter, and around the 1720s, the church found it "got kind of out of control," Casey says. It was to remind celebrants what the holiday actually stood for that the church first associated a botanical item—customary for all saints—with St. Patrick, assigning him the symbol of the likewise lucky shamrock.

While St. Patrick's Day is now associated with wearing green, parades (when they're not canceled) and beer, the holiday is grounded in history that dates back more than 1,500 years. The earliest known celebrations were held in the 17th century on March 17, marking the anniversary of the death of St. Patrick in the 5th century. Learn more about the holiday's history and how it evolved into the event it is today.



1. The Real St. Patrick Was Born in Britain

Much of what is known about St. Patrick's life has been interwoven with folklore and legend. Historians generally believe that St. Patrick, the patron saint of Ireland, was born in Britain (not Ireland) near the end of the 4th century. At age 16 he was kidnapped by Irish raiders and sold as a slave to a Celtic priest in Northern Ireland. After toiling for six years as a shepherd, he escaped back to Britain. He eventually returned to Ireland as a Christian missionary.



2. There Were No Snakes Around for St. Patrick to Banish from Ireland

Among the legends associated with St. Patrick is that he stood atop an Irish hillside and banished snakes from Ireland—prompting all serpents to slither away into the sea. In fact, research suggests snakes never occupied the Emerald Isle in the first place. There are no signs of snakes in the country's fossil record. And water has surrounded Ireland since the last glacial period. Before that, the region was covered in ice and would have been too cold for the reptiles.



3. Leprechauns Are Likely Based on Celtic Fairies

The red-haired, green-clothed Leprechaun is commonly associated with St. Patrick's Day. The original Irish name for these figures of folklore is "lobaircin," meaning "small-bodied fellow." Belief in leprechauns likely stems from Celtic belief in fairies—tiny men and women who could use their magical powers to serve good or evil. In Celtic folktales, leprechauns were cranky souls, responsible for mending the shoes of the other fairies.

4. The Shamrock Was Considered a Sacred Plant

The shamrock, a three-leaf clover, has been associated with Ireland for centuries. It was called the "seamroy" by the Celts and was considered a sacred plant that symbolized the arrival of spring. According to legend, St. Patrick used the plant as a visual guide when explaining the Holy Trinity. By the 17th century, the shamrock had become a symbol of emerging Irish nationalism.



While people in Ireland had celebrated St. Patrick since the 1600s, the tradition of a St. Patrick's Day parade began in America and actually predates the founding of the United States.

Records show that a St. Patrick's Day parade was held on March 17, 1601 in a Spanish colony in what is now St. Augustine, Florida. The parade, and a St. Patrick's Day celebration a year earlier were organized by the Spanish Colony's Irish vicar Ricardo Artur. More than a century later, homesick Irish soldiers serving in the English military marched in Boston in 1737 and in New York City on March 17. Enthusiasm for the St. Patrick's Day parades in New York City, Boston and other early American cities only grew from there. In 2020 and 2021, parades throughout the country, including in New York City and Boston were canceled or postponed for the first time in decades due to the outbreak of the COVID-19 virus.

6. The Irish Were Once Scorned in America

While Irish Americans are now proud to showcase their heritage, the Irish were not always celebrated by fellow Americans. Beginning in 1845, a devastating potato blight caused widespread hunger throughout Ireland. While approximately 1 million perished, another 2 million abandoned their land in the largest-single population movement of the 19th century. Most of the exiles—nearly a quarter of the Irish nation—came to the shores of the United States. Once they arrived, the Irish refugees were looked down upon as disease-ridden, unskilled and a drain on welfare budgets.

7. Corned Beef and Cabbage Was an American Innovation

The meal that became a St. Patrick's Day staple across the country—corned beef and cabbage—was an American innovation. While ham and cabbage were eaten in Ireland, corned beef offered a cheaper substitute for impoverished immigrants. Irish-Americans living in the slums of lower Manhattan in the late 19th century and early 20th, purchased leftover corned beef from ships returning from the tea trade in China. The Irish would boil the beef three times—the last time with cabbage—to remove some of the brine.



While I will still check my email regularly when I am in the office, I will not be made aware of them when I am out of the office and will only occasionally check email during those times. This means that email is not a good way to reach me in an emergency; in those circumstances, please call or text. If the subject can wait until I am next in the office, then email is a fine way to contact me.

If you have any questions or concerns, please reach out to me using the most appropriate method from the options above. Of course, you can always speak to me directly on Sunday morning or if you come by the Church office during the week.

Hope Pregnancy Center is also looking for more volunteer board members and volunteer father-hood coaches for our Earn While You Learn Parenting Program.



Bible Studies at CLC


ADULT BIBLE STUDIES...


