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#### PASTOR'S MESSAGE

"It is good to give thanks to the LORD, to sing praises to your name, O Most High; to declare your steadfast love in the morning, and your faithfulness by night...." Psalm 92:1–2 (ESV)

With the start of the school year behind us and the leaves on the trees well into their autumnal color shift, thoughts turn to the activities of late fall and the start of the "holiday season." Already the stores have started to condense their displays of candy, costumes & accessories, and jack-o-lantern making supplies to make space for the "Autumn" themed décor so often associated with Thanksgiving. Sooner or later the various voices in politics, the media, and the retail industry will begin to talk about how this is the time of year for "being grateful" and how we should all take the time to "give thanks" for what we have 1 1 in life.

While normally I am not one who is quick to find myself in agreement with politicians, media pundits, or retailers – all of whom are looking to sell you something - I must admit that they are correct. This is 5 indeed the time of year for us especially to 5 be grateful for what we have and to give thanks for it (though we ought to be doing that year-round, not just in November). There is, however, one thing that I cannot 6 help but wonder when the various voices in the secular realm encourage us to "be grateful" and "give thanks": to whom are  $\overline{7}$  they encouraging us to give thanks and be grateful?

The sad truth is that our secular world is very  $\frac{1}{0}$  much just that – "secular". Society seems to be in a constant state of moving further and further away from God, His Word, and His ways. Increasingly, people are encouraged to look to themselves, their own desires, and their own best Lincoln's Thanksgiving Proclamation from interests for guidance, direction, and encouragement in life. In recent years, I have even heard some politicians and media pundits declare that Thanksgiving is a time for people to

cultivate a mindset of gratitude within themselves and to focus on developing a general attitude of thankfulness; in the vast majority of what I hear, however, there is one thing missing – God!

In the talk that I hear from the secular voices in our society about being grateful and thankful, most of it is encouraging people to try and develop those qualities or attributes within themselves. They are encouraging people to focus within themselves and they are most definitely NOT talking about

directing that gratitude and thanksgiving to God. And, yet, that is exactly the one to whom we SHOULD be directing our thanks.

The Bible is full of passages that encourage, exhort, direct, and urge us to give thanks to God, to be grateful to Him. They reveal to us the truth that all we have and are comes from God, as a gift and trust from Him that we care for as His stewards. Psalm 92 reminds us that "It is good to give thanks to the LORD", as do many other of the Psalms (and remember, when You see "LORD" in the Old Testament that's the word they used instead of God's name, so the Psalmist is saying "It is good to give thanks to GOD"). Throughout the year, and especially at Thanksgiving, we are grateful to God for all the blessings He has bestowed upon us and we give thanks to God for all the good we have received.

Even the secular world, which often seems loathed to mention God or have anything good to say about Him or His people, is supposed to direct their thanks and gratitude to God on Thanksgiving. Abraham October 3, 1863 that is viewed as the origin of the modern holiday of Thanksgiving includes these words, "They are the gracious (Continued on page 5)

And I recommend to them that while offering up the ascriptions justly due to Him for such singular deliverances and blessings, they do also, with humble penitence for our national perverseness and disobedience, commend to His tender care all those who have become widows, orphans, mourners or sufferers in the lamentable civil strife in which we are unavoidably engaged, and fervently implore the interposition of the Almighty Hand to heal the wounds of the nation and to restore it as soon as may be consistent with the Divine purposes to the full enjoyment of peace, harmony, tranquility and Union." 



# GETTING TO KNOW OUR MEMBERS...

CLC's featured member for November is Pat DiDomizio. Pat was born and raised in Waterbury, CT as a devout Roman Catholic. He grew up as a member of Our Lady of Lourdes Church in Waterbury, where he faithfully served as an altar boy, was active in the Catholic Youth Organization (CYO,) and even contemplated a calling to the priesthood. Pat was an exemplary student who served his school, community, and church with fervor.

In 1955, a beautiful new girl, Judy Schnaars, moved to town, hailing from Fort Lee, NJ. Although Judy and Pat attended different schools in Waterbury at the time, they were both equally devoted to academics and community service, leaving no doubt that their paths would cross. Well, cross they did, time and time again, beginning with an award ceremony where both Pat and Judy were being honored with the same award! (For the first, but not the last time.) The two youths were awarded for their community involvement, each for their own school. They shook hands as they received their awards, which left Pat with the thought, "Gee, she's cute!"

Well, the pair ended up meeting again when they discovered that they were both attending Crosby High School. And wouldn't you know that not only was Pat the captain of the football team, but Judy was the captain of the cheerleader squad! Their paths crossed repeatedly as they were both class officers, and both won the same community involvement award – again. The good-looking, popular, well-loved pair became good friends as they were continuously thrown together in what seemed like a thou-sand different ways. What a perfect couple they would make if they were to date, BUT there was one thing keeping them apart...religion. As Pat was a devout Catholic, Judy was raised a faithful Lutheran. Their religious beliefs created a gap that inhibited their dating.

After graduation, Judy attended Valparaiso University in Indiana, a Lutheran school, where she studied to become a Deaconess. Guess who else ended up going to college in Indiana...Pat! Likewise, he followed his religion by attending the Catholic University of Notre Dame. Pat and Judy stayed in touch by the old-fashioned method of writing letters. Then one fateful summer day, after their freshman year of college, they met at a party back home in Waterbury. It was finally at this time that the pair decided to overlook their religious barrier and date. After a wonderful summer of falling in love, Judy departed to Germany for a year. She went to honor her Lutheran commitment of working in education, at an orphanage with handicapped and special needs children, while Pat continued his studies and pursuit of sports at Notre Dame.

Upon Judy's return from Germany, she enrolled at UConn. The two continued dating long distance while attending schools far away from each other through letter correspondence - imagine, no cell phones! They soon became serious, and eventually decided to wed. Fine with Judy, as long as it was in a Lutheran church, and fine with Pat, as long as it was in a Catholic church. Oh no – religion getting in the way yet again! Ironically, on Easter Sunday of 1964, the young couple broke up because they just couldn't make this work. Not the end of the story though, because after a few weeks (of pure misery for Pat without Judy), knowing that Pat worked at the Boys Club in Waterbury on Saturday mornings, right by the store where Judy shopped, she spotted his car and left a note on it that simply read "Call me." Judy graciously agreed to wed in a Catholic church. Following a lengthy search to find a Catholic priest enlightened and liberal enough to marry a Catholic boy to a Lutheran girl, Pat and Judy were married on November 20, 1965, at Blessed Sacrament Church in Waterbury. The priest requested that Judy sign a document vowing to raise their children in the Catholic church. She refused to sign, but fortunately, he married them anyway. Being that the DiDomizios were married in the month of November, it only seems fitting we feature their story this month.

Prior to their wedding, Judy landed a fellowship at New York University in social work. Always a Magna Cum Laude student, she finished her education with a master's degree in Education and teaching certificate from Southern CT State Uni-



versity. Judy dedicated her career to elementary school education, teaching first in Waterbury, and then in Cheshire.

As for Pat, he spent his career in federal law enforcement, retiring in 1998 as Chief of the Pretrial Services Unit for the United States District Court in CT. He then contracted with the US government to do federal investigations for security clearances. Pat proudly served the community of Cheshire as Commissioner of the Junior Football League, Little League Coach, and member of the CHS Gridiron Club. He was also a lifelong member of the Boys Club of Waterbury and acted as President of their Board of Directors for a number of years, with Judy by his side. She helped him to initiate the inclusion of girls into the Boys Club,

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which is now known nationwide as the Boys & Girls Club of America. Pat earned the title of Jaycee Man of the Year for outstanding service to our community in 1991. Judy earned the title of Teacher of the Year in 1991 as well. Again, the pair earned awards together!

Pat and Judy began their life together in Oakville. They later moved to Waterbury, and finally settled in Cheshire. God blessed them with two precious children, daughter Jennifer in 1968 and son David in 1971. Jennifer attended Syracuse University and was active in sports, while David attended and played football at Lehigh University. Pat and Judy happily spent countless weekends traveling to upstate New York and Pennsylvania to support their children's college careers. Jennifer now lives in Astoria, Queens, and works in Communications for one of the biggest wine auction houses in the world. David lives in San Francisco and works for the US State Department, Office of Foreign Missions. Through his job, he met a Japanese girl, Fumiko, who was also working for the State Department, Office of Foreign Missions out of Seattle. They fell in love, married in Hawaii, and welcomed a son, Tomohiro Patrick, also known as Tommy.

In their early days together, Pat and Judy attended churches of both faiths. Judy's family moved to Cheshire and joined CLC. During the 1960's, the DiDomizio couple began attending CLC regularly, and then Judy joined. Reluctant at first to become a



member, Pat became increasingly involved with Judy in CLC, and they grew together in their faith with their newfound church family. Before long, Pat became a member. The couple baptized their children and grandchild at CLC. Jennifer and David were involved in the church during their youth, attending Sunday School, youth group, and volunteering.

Religion, the one thing that threatened for so many years to tear this couple apart, ended up becoming the strongest foundation on which they built their life together. Pat and Judy faithfully served CLC in so many ways. Judy served as Sunday School Superintendent and Teacher, Education Deacon, Vacation Bible School Coordinator, Altar Assistant, and member of the Columbarium and Memorial Garden Committee. Pat serves our church in numerous capacities as well; as an Altar Assistant, Stewardship Deacon, Usher, Chairman of the Call Committee for Pastor Rowold, helped found the Columbarium and Memorial Garden, and started the Wellness and Safety Committee. Both also mentored Confirmation students. Since Judy's passing in May of 2021, Pat is now actively looking into forming a bereavement group to offer support to other church members who are grieving the loss of loved ones. Church has been an essential part of Pat and Judy's life together and a focal point that anchored their social lives too. The DiDomizios, together with the Gancarzs, Drusts, and Mulvaneys, spent summers together over the years vacationing at the Gancarz's Vermont lake house. Pat appreciates the dear friends he has made throughout his membership with CLC.

Pat cites that he and Judy were extremely fortunate to have traveled extensively throughout all the European countries, along with Japan, Tunisia, and more. His most memorable travels were the trips they took after the kids came along. The whole family enjoyed vacations to Hilton Head, the Outer Banks of North Carolina, and several cruises. Being that Judy was fluent in German, Pat found Germany to be his

favorite European country. He also appreciated the beauty of the Canadian Rockies.

Along with travel, Pat enjoys golf and swimming. He now lives in a lovely community in Oxford which offers a golf course, along with indoor and outdoor pools. He likes to read historical novels and considers Jon Meacham as his favorite author. Pat also likes to write and has penned letters to the editor for the Waterbury newspaper, along with stories for the Notre Dame alumni magazine. He has even considered authoring a book of his own. Pat is an avid Notre Dame football and Yankees baseball fan. And here is a little-known fact about Pat, he has a "long gone hidden talent" for playing the guitar.

Pat gushes that his amazing love story and marriage to Judy are his greatest accomplishments and that it is because of her that he has led such a charmed life. He is thankful for God's great blessings, especially for Judy, because her being a true Lutheran through and through led him to the Lutheran faith, and to our CLC family of brothers and sisters that he will cherish forever.

# FIRE SAFETY FROM THE WELLNESS COMMITTEE...

October was National Fire Prevention month. In Little Cherubs, the students talked about what to do in case there was a fire in their homes, and they were visited by a fire engine from the Cheshire Fire Department. Even though we didn't talk about it very much during our Sunday morning announcements, it's still important to be prepared.

#### FIRE SAFETY TIPS AT HOME

1. Make sure you have working smoke alarms in your home – one for every level. Remember to check all of them every month and to change the batteries regularly. (Twice a year is a common recommendation, and the beginning and end of daylight savings time can be a helpful reminder.) For added safety you can get units that are both smoke and carbon monoxide alarms.

2. Avoid electrical fires by unplugging appliances when not in use (This can save on your electricity bill too.) and do not overload outlets by plugging in too many devices with things like power strips. When using an extension cord, make sure it is thicker than the cord for the device you are plugging in (to keep from overloading the extension cord) and do not put electrical wires under rugs or in high traffic areas.

3. Consider getting at least one fire extinguisher for your home. More fires start in the kitchen that in any other room, so this would be a good place to have one. Remember to get a fire extinguisher that is designed to work on common fires you might have in your home.

4. Clean the lint trap of your clothes dryer regularly, preferably after every drying cycle, and clear out any lint under or behind the dryer twice a year. Fires in residential areas often start in the clothes dryer.

5. Have an escape plan for how you will get out of your home if there is ever a fire. Make sure you know the route out of every room in your house and practice getting out. Practice staying low to the ground and checking doors with the back of your hand to see if it is hot. Don't forget to designate a place outside of the home and far enough away where everyone will gather to make sure they are safe.

#### IF THERE IS EVER A FIRE AT CHURCH

Make your way to the nearest exit and go outside; when you are outside head to one of two meeting places. If you see the Church sign when you get outside, you are at the front of the building – head towards the sign and wait on the front lawn by it. If you see the large white cross, you are at the back or the side of the building – head towards the cross and wait on the back lawn by it. If you have limited mobility, ask for help and other members will assist you in getting as far from the building as possible.

The Wellness & Safety Committee continues to meet as needed, and we are looking to plan First Aid/CPR/AED training, as well as another presentation about safety, as soon as we can arrange them. If you have any questions or would like to join the Wellness & Safety Committee, please contact Pat DiDomizio or Pastor Rowold.

#### THE RIPPEL REPORT—NOVEMBER 2022..

#### Glory, Glory, Halleluiah

All aboard, I ask that you join me on a historic, "old-fashioned" steam train journey back into the days of civil war history. The timeline is early July 1861. We will be boarding at Boston Mass station, destination Washington D.C. I cannot guarantee that our trip will be comfortable, or fast, nor even safe.

I will introduce you to a party of prominent persons, each devoted Christians, citizens of New England. All dedicated to stopping the spread of slavery in our nation. All are part of the powerful abolitionist movement. This grassroots movement spread like wildfire across the states in the North, involving churches parish members, social and humanitarian networks, and numerous volunteer citizens. Collectively they would protest, publish the evils of slavery, citing this as a godless, inhumane institution. They put pressure on government agencies and politicians to abolish slavery in the New England states. Connecticut stopped slavery in 1837 by abolition. They worked closely with their spies and counterparts in the southern states to develop the Underground Railroad which provided numerous safe houses to move large numbers of escaped slaves to Canada. Abolitionists were both powerful and influential in making the entire United States population aware of the inhumanity of slavery and the slave owners.

The leaders of this organization, from both Massachusetts and Connecticut, will be aboard this train heading South. It is my pleasure to introduce each notable leader to you. But first, there are many questions you may have, these deserve answers on this journey. What stops and between stops will we make? Travel at night? Facilities, food, drink, sanitation, fellow passengers, security, why are we going at all? The spokespersons and leaders for the abolition movement, have been invited to meet with newly elected President Abraham Lincoln, note that the civil war exploded less than three months ago in April 1861.


In addition to be meeting with the President, our delegation from the North will be meeting with other Washington officials to discuss the problems, solutions, resources available for the expansion of the emancipation agenda and how to move it forward and rapidly. There will be some 30 individuals and their families making this journey.


Representing Massachusetts is William Lloyd Garrison, owner, and publisher of The Liberator. A widely distributed newspaper, featuring anti-slavery articles, sketches, and interviews with escaped slaves. His publications aroused so much fury in the South, he became the only civilian in the civil war constantly being threatened with a bounty to kidnap, hold for trial and then execute.


Next, the Episcopal Minister, Reverend Henry Ward Beecher. Regularly, Beecher, a "fire and brimstone" Preacher would condemn the South's institution of slavery, the owners, overseers, and traders. Reverend Beecher's daughter, Harriet Beecher Stowe, author of Uncle Tom's Cabin would inflame the southern states in outrage over the shocking truth of slave conditions. At the coming meeting with President Lincoln, he would greet Mrs. Stowe, from Litchfield CT, with the following phrase "so you are the little lady who helped start this big war".

There are many more devout and dedicated abolitionists I could introduce our readers to; however, time is short. One couple you should meet, Mr. Samuel Gridley Howe and his wife Julia Ward Howe. He is a professor of theology at the New England College, also appointed to Lincoln's cabinet as chair of the Sanitary Commission. A vital assignment, over 1/2 of the 3/4 million war dead was due to improper hygiene and sanitation. His wife Julia is an accomplished writer of religious materials and as a poetess.


The scene is set for our journey to the nation's Capital. Early morning 7:00 AM, July 2nd, 1861, passengers inside the Boston railroad station fanned themselves, another hot day ahead. The gentlemen standing in small groups talking about the trip ahead. Several had made the trip before, and shared facts to the uncertainty of these first timers. The train would be 8 railroad cars in locked tandem. First the steam engine then two cars each filled with firewood, which would burn and boil huge amounts of water. Then, 2 passenger cars, capacity 50 each. Next, our special Pullman overnighter. The next two cars carry union troops. There would be a company of 100 troops in union blue uniforms, with rifles bedrolls and haversacks (backpacks) on their shoulders.

These soldiers would be for our protection as we pass through the southern states of Virginia and Baltimore, Maryland. In the November 1860 presidential elections, Abraham Lincoln campaigned on emancipation, the abolishment of all slavery in the South and nationwide. This had already been accomplished in the northern states in the 1830s, including Connecticut. President Lincoln's inauguration was set for March 1861. This date was to avoid difficult travel in winter conditions. Unlike on



today's inauguration date of January 20<sup>th</sup>.

Maryland, back then, was a slave state and with confederate sympathy. As 11 southern states seceded from the union, President Lincoln had all Maryland officials arrested and held at Fort Warren in Boston harbor for the duration of the war. This was done to prevent secession. Had Maryland joined the southern states, a ring of confederate military would have closed in on Washington DC and the war would have been won by the South. Fearing the capture and assassination of Lincoln, he passed through Baltimore MD in disguise as an elderly gent, not wearing a top hat, but a stocking cap, eyeglasses, beard trimmed and covered in a shawl, he was led by Pinkerton security safely from one train to the next train. When word got out, Maryland citizens were furious. On April 19th, 1861, violence erupted in the streets of Baltimore MD. Union troops from Massachusetts and Pennsylvania were attacked, 12 civilians were dead and more wounded. So, tensions would be high when we stop and change rail lines in Baltimore, the troops are for our protection.

With all the passengers in the station, soldiers outside on the platform, the stationmaster addressed our group. He spoke on behalf of the railroad. First, a complimentary breakfast was offered to all. He wished all a safe and successful trip. Next, he said to take note and write down the

following details of our trip ahead. Our journey will be 5 days and due to the rail locations to major and minor stops some 600 miles induration. When we leave Boston station our next stop is Providence RI then New Haven CT then New York City and then Philadelphia PA. We will pass through Baltimore MD, switch over rail lines to Washington DC. During this, Union troops on board will safeguard passengers and our train as well. There will be no night travel. Each night at sunset we will rest in a station hiding safely and bed down. There will be numerous other stops small towns etc. to load more firewood and supplies of water. Water tanks are placed along the rail route along with vital supplies. There will be baggage handlers to assist as well as extra conductors to answer questions. The stationmaster then answered all questions and was alerted by the train whistle as our train pulled into the station. The next five days were smooth and uneventful, and everyone relaxed and engaged in friendly talk.

Arriving in Washington DC, the nation's capital, the effects of preparations for war were everywhere expecting a confederate attack. Our party checked into the Willard Hotel, DC's best lodging. Having arrived in DC July 12, 1861, the nation's capital was in a panic on a war footing. The abolitionist group concluded their business meetings with the President, cabinet members and special officers. The city was being evacuated due to the serious threat of invasion. The confederate forces were only 25 miles away at Manassas (Bull Run). Union forces were already on the march to engage the enemy under general McDowell. Just before the Howe's left DC they had assured close friends in Boston that they would have a brief visit with their 19 year old son at his encampment. They joined a pastor for a prayer and exchange of gifts with the young man. Union soldiers marched in large numbers and kept in step by marching to the popular words and melody of abolitionist's favorite "John Brown's Body". However, the troops inserted their off color and foul words instead. Ladies were deeply offended and covered the ears of the young children. Some screamed at officers to make the marching men to stop, to no avail. Julia Howe made

notes in her travel journal. In civil war times, not only were families accepted at training camps, they were encouraged to come, for morale reasons. Late that afternoon, visitors assembled in carriages, wagons and returned to the capital under military escort.

Arriving at the Willard Hotel near dark, the Howe's had dinner and retired to their rooms. Julia Howe, in her mind, mulling over the day's events, remembered the statement the pastor had directed at her saying, Mrs. Howe, why do you not right good words for that stirring tune? That night Julia Howe was inspired, she recalled how the verses were weaving themselves together as she drifted to sleep. Afraid she would forget them by dawn, she forced herself out of bed, lit a candle, picked up a broken stub of pencil, a scrap of paper and wrote the words to what would become




the most famous hymn of the Union. Howe deserved a great deal of praise for her poem. One day after considerable public attention, Howe said "I wish very much that it may some service in time of peace, which I pray God, may never more be broken". In February 1861, the "Battle Hymn of the Republic" was published in the Atlantic Monthly for \$4 to protect copyright laws. Samuel and Julia Ward Howe would remain very active in religious circles writing articles, woman's suffrage, and abolitionist activities. Their family would consist of 6 children. Julia would pass away at Newport RI on October 17, 1910 at age 91.
