Pastor's Message

"And this is the testimony of John [the Baptist], when the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, 'Who are you?' ... So they said to him, 'Who are you? We need to give an answer to those who sent us. What do you say about yourself?" John 1:19, 22 (ESV)

Who are you? That seems to be the perennial question in life. How do you define yourself? What is your identity? People use all kinds of things to define themselves and can point to a plethora of attributes or characteristics in which they can find their identity. There is race, gender, and sexual orientation. It could be job, socio-economic status, or hobbies/ pastimes. For some, it's the place they live or where they came from. With sports fans, it may be their favorite team – especially

Who are you? Political party or philosophy or preferred candidate can also make it onto the list. Military service (including branch) is also common and so are clubs or associations of which one may be a member. We may also look to our relationships to answer that question, monikers like mother, father, son, daughter, sister, brother, uncle, aunt, or cousin. Which one or ones that are chosen all depends on the person to whom you are speaking and the circumstances in which the question is asked.

Who are you? There really are all kinds of ways that we could answer the question. But there is one answer that makes more difference than all the rest combined. One thing that is more essential, more determinative, and has a greater impact on your entire life. It influences every other way in which you might define yourself; it forms and informs any other characteristic by which you may identify. That one answer, that one thing that is so seminal that one the people asked John the Baptist. It's it has an impact on each and every other thing in the one the world asks us, and the one we your life is none other than your baptism. That's right, your baptism. The fact that you are baptized changes everything.

When you were washed by water and the Word in Holy Baptism, you were given your defining identity. There in the font you were named "Child of God" and you bear that label – and that identity – throughout your life. Every other characteristic or quality or attribute by which we may define ourselves or find our identity is shaped by the fact that you are first and foremost a baptized child of God. The water poured on you and the Word spoken over you on the day of your baptism wasn't just a one-time thing.

something that occurred on that day and made only that day different. No, your baptism has a lasting impact on your life and makes EVERY day different.

Your identity as a baptized child of God changes the way that we view all those other ways that we may choose to define ourselves. It comes first and shapes all the others, just like it shapes each and every day of our lives and all our interactions with each other. It is a fact, an objective reality that does not change, cannot be taken away, and stands firm in the face of the questions and uncertainty that this life may bring.

The water wet your head, the Word of God was spoken, and you ARE a baptized child of God; that means God loves you and cares for you no matter what you do or what happens to you in life. You are so important to God, so valuable to Him, that He willingly gave His only-begotten Son as the price paid to rescue you from sin, death, and the devil. You matter to God and He will never leave or abandon you; He is always with you.





GETTING TO KNOW OUR MEMBERS...

CLC's featured members for January are Marilyn and Frank Miller. It seems only fitting to feature the Millers to kick off the new year since this article was the brainchild of Marilyn. As our Evangelism Deacon, Marilyn inspired many new ways of spreading evangelism, one of which was getting to know our fellow congregants better through sharing their life stories. Thank you, Marilyn, for helping us get to know each other better!



While young New Britain High School junior, Marilyn Blair, was attending Mr. Recano's American Democracy class, she met a classmate by the name of Frank Miller – and so our story begins. As a teacher, Mr. Recano was very serious...until he wasn't. Sometimes at the end of class, he would allow the students some downtime to goof around. This is when the boys would brandish their peashooters and fling spitballs at the girls and pull other silly pranks. Wouldn't you know that the "cute and fun" boy that Marilyn noticed in class ended up shooting spitballs at her, and before long she was doing his homework, and they were headed on their first date. They went to a formal dance on a double date with another couple, who are married to this day. The foursome remained friends and continue to get together regularly.

Frank and Marilyn are both Connecticut natives who were born and raised in New Britain, CT as devout Lutherans. Marilyn was involved with the Walther League, a Lutheran youth group, while Frank belonged to his church basketball league. Three years after high school graduation, this inseparable couple was married in St. Matthew's Lutheran Church in New Britain on May 30, 1959, almost to the day of their first date.

The Millers began their life together in Bristol with education playing a huge role. After high school, Frank went to a two-year business school with the dream of becoming an Accountant, but this degree just didn't do the trick. He then enrolled at the University of Hartford, where he attended night school for the first eight years of their marriage while working for a Certified Public Accounting (CPA) firm by day, along with a couple of other part-time jobs. Ambitious young Frank earned his BS degree in accounting, passed the CPA exam, and was made a partner of the firm! He spent his entire career here, eventually buying out the practice and becoming the sole owner before taking on two partners of his own, one of which is the Millers' only son, John.

After high school, Marilyn aspired to be a nurse. She enrolled in a brand-new Practical Nurse training program where she studied to become a Licensed Practical Nurse (LPN.) She worked as an LPN at Bristol Hospital before the children came along. Years later, after losing her mom to cancer, she sought to become a Registered Nurse (RN) with the goal of providing better care to cancer patients. While parenting four teenage children, Marilyn went to nursing school at Mattatuck Community College for two years where she earned her RN. She then went on to earn her BS degree in nursing from Central CT State University and work for New Britain General Hospital. Marilyn later took her favorite job of all, which was working as a Hospice Coordinator and Nurse for the Southington Visiting Nurses Association, where she helped to develop their hospice care program. Giving back has always been in Marilyn's nature – she taught practical nursing at E.C. Goodwin Technical High School, where she was also the graduation speaker twice.

The happy couple bought their first house in New Britain, where their four children were raised, and later settled in Southington where they reside today. Their firstborn was daughter Laura, a retired Special Education Teacher who specialized in working with children with autism. She has three children and one grandchild. Next came their son John, who followed in his dad's footsteps and now is an owner in the CPA firm that Frank started years ago. John has two daughters and one granddaughter. Their daughter Beth followed her mom's nursing path by earning her Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP,) she


previously owned a visiting nurse agency, and she now works for the DART child advocacy program at Yale. Beth has a son and a daughter. Their daughter Lisa is a Teacher and Reading Specialist in Southington and has two boys. The grand tally for the Miller family = four children, nine grandchildren, and two greatgrandchildren. The four Miller children are all local CT residents, making holidays and special occasions quite large events for this expanded family.

Marilyn and Frank have always loved to travel. In addition to the timeshare they own and visit regularly in Aruba (sometimes with the entire extended family!) – they have been to Europe, including Germany and Austria, and Frank traveled to



England where he hiked in the Lake District with a group of runners. They have also visited multiple Caribbean islands VBS and traveled all over the USA including California, Alaska, Hawaii, and family trips to Disney. With Marilyn's lifelong dream of seeing Hawaii, one of their most memorable travel moments occurred in Maui. They took a tour that started out at 3:30 a.m. to ascend a volcano for over an hour and a half to reach the summit which was 10,000 feet high. They were rewarded with the most magnificent view ever of the sun rising at eye level over the crystal blue ocean as they were perched above the clouds. This gorgeous sight gave them chills, as Marilyn realized her childhood dream come true. Frank and Marilyn also fondly recall the time they were able to score tickets to the Rose Bowl Parade and Football game in California. Through friends they knew who created a parade float with their Lutheran church, the couple was able to go behind the scenes and act as 'Petal Pushers' in the float barn to help add flowers to the float. It was amazing for them to see the rose-bedecked floats up close and personal.

The Miller pair has dedicated their time and talents to community involvement throughout their life together. The family belonged to the Zion Lutheran Church in Southington. While the kids were young, Marilyn was involved with the Girl Scouts, taught Sunday school, served on countless councils and PTAs, and acted as President of the congregation. Frank was an active volunteer who served as the President of the Southington Kiwanis Club and both Treasurer and President of the Southington YMCA. He also served on the Southington Savings Bank board and as Board Chair for the Hospital of Central CT for three years. Frank was also very active in the church, serving on the council and the building committee. Together the two worked for many years for the Zion Lutheran Church running booths and preparing apple fritters for the annual





Here's a little-known fact: Marilyn and Frank were both runners for 40 years! They are also avid golfers who enjoy playing the game together. And who knew Frank is quite the musician? He played saxophone in his high school band and was selected to play in the CT All-State band. He also played in a Polish Polka band that performed at weddings, and in a band that played at high school dances. He sang in the bands as well and is a fan of

Dixieland and Big Band music, while Marilyn preferred the opera. Frank enjoys reading for relaxation and favors novels, especially those of John Grisham. Marilyn and Frank are devoted UConn Men's and Women's basketball fans. They went to numerous games over the years with their season tickets and still attend games on occasion. In addition, Frank loves football including UConn and watching the Patriots and Tampa Bay as he follows Tom Brady's career moves. He is a Red Sox baseball and Celtics basketball fan too.

Marilyn has always been a passionate crafter. It's a wonder she found the time for all her knitting, crocheting, sewing, and flower arranging, on top of her other hobbies which include gardening, decorating, tending her Koi Pond, and feeding the birds. Marilyn's love for sewing led her to one of her most ardent endeavors to date. She runs 'Cheshire Quilting Chicks,' which is the local group for the National Quilts of Valor Foundation. This is an organization founded in 2003 from a dream by its founder, Catherine Roberts. While Catherine's son was deployed in Iraq, she had a dream where a young man was sitting hunched over on his bed plagued by despair and war demons. Then, she saw him wrapped in a quilt and he changed to being hopeful and well. The message she drew from this dream was that quilts = healing, and thus the idea was born. The foundation now consists of thousands of volunteer quilters around the country who come together at 'sew-ins' to create quilts, which they award to Veterans as a way of providing warmth and thanking them for their service. Marilyn hosts 'sew-ins' here at our church and has helped to contribute to the 330,000 Quilts of Valor that have been gifted since the program's inception.

The Millers joined our CLC family around ten years ago and have been devoted members ever since. Marilyn serves as our Evangelism Deacon where she saw her vision of a church scholarship realized through establishing the CLC Scholarship


some time in January and we will get out a wish list soon after that. If you have planets, stars or a space ship you want to get rid of let us know we just may be able to make use of it.


As always, we need volunteers! The list to sign up will be out by the end of March. Come join us as we Shine Jesus' Light this summer at VBS.





THE RIPPEL REPORT—JANUARY 2023..

Unforgettable...In Every Way

For many years, the Readers Digest published a monthly article entitled, "The most unforgettable character I have ever met." The word 'character' is used to denote the qualities of a person and not intended to demean or imply odd or unusual behavior.

Each of us, throughout our lives, relate and associate with thousands, perhaps even tens of thousands of different individuals. Whether these relationships are close ones or just casual in nature, there are never two that are identical in every respect. If you and I were to carefully review the most important and influential persons whom we have met during our lifetime, whom would you select? What would the criteria and reasoning be like in making these difficult decisions? Finally, as your list is reviewed and reduced, who alone would stand above all others in your mind and heart? Tough choices, yes indeed perhaps a parent, spouse, child, relative, friend or business acquaintance? With this special position of honor that one individual would hold be based on personal qualities, or achievements or perhaps influence exerted upon your life? Maybe a combination of all three of the above.

The categories of influential persons you have met can be extensive. Consider educators, humanitarians, clergy members, artists, writers, sports and entertainment personalities, military officials, business, and political figures. The list of possibilities never seems to end.

If I were asked to define that one special unforgettable character, I would say this: a person whose life demonstrates integrity faith and wisdom. Someone who by example and accomplishments profoundly affects and changes the lives of many individuals. Finally, an individual who lives on in memory as one admired, respected and loved by those persons whose lives he or she has changed for the better.


Let me introduce you to the most unforgettable character I have ever met and known. His name was Louis T. Bucheimer, a Lutheran pastor who lived an extraordinary life in faith, witness and deeds for God, Church, and Christianity.

I first met this gentleman in 1942 as a 10-year-old church school pupil. The following year I began a two-year confirmation training program, which was conducted by the pastor. The instruction and knowledge I received from the pastor, I credit with securing my roots in Christianity throughout my life.

Pastor Bucheimer was a masterful teacher and a veritable walking encyclopedia of Scripture. He had the gift of storytelling that could make the Bible an exciting and understandable adventure. As pastor of Grace Lutheran in the Bronx NY for many years, the parish grew and was very successful. With advancing years, the congregation assumed that pastor would be there right up to his retirement to rest from his labors and to rest on his laurels, but this was not to be.

This pastor became concerned and involved with mission work, basically in Chinatown, New York. He helped to organize True Light Lutheran, then volunteered his services to assist this congregation in building a new church. True Light was the first Protestant church to be built in Chinatown, a beacon of hope and faith to the teeming masses.

Up to this point in my story, in the ministry of this man, there would be excellence, but nothing exceptional to justify the description, "unforgettable". Just as the minister in the novel, "One Foot in Heaven" feels compelled to answer a higher calling and accept greater challenges

and move on, so did Pastor Bucheimer. He had a great compassion for, and was revered by, the Chinese American community. He decided to become a full-time missionary in the Far East. During this period, the late 40s and early 50s, the Far East was boiling with unrest and war. Americans were resented and referred to as "ugly". Christians were targets for terrorists and bandit gangs. Ideas of western world religion and teaching were despised and suppressed.



Japan resented the imposed army of occupation. The Philippines and Malaysia had major communist terrorist campaigns. Mainland China had experienced a people's revolution the "great leap forward". Chinese fled to Formosa, to the safety of nationalist China. There were refugee and resettlement camps, hospitals, orphanages, food distribution centers, relief centers etcetera. It was into this world of human need and suffering and real danger that this man of God carried the messages and promises of Christ

To the remote and often inaccessible villages of mainland China, into the jungle swamp communities of the Philippines where seaplane was the only means of transportation in and out, teaching, reaching and winning souls for Christ, performing all the



necessary acts of mission ministry. The impact and accomplishments of this pastor are legendary. He is credited with starting some 230 mission congregations throughout the Far East over a span of several years. Countless lives changed saved and nourished by this one man's effort and determination.

In conclusion, many years later our family attended the 1964-65 World's Fair in Flushing Meadow New York. We visited the Protestant Pavilion. This setting for this presentation was a scaled down replica of the Mormon Tabernacle temple. The host and Hostess representing the Protestant religious themes in America were pastor Bucheimer and his wife. The years had been favorable to them both and we reminisced at length.

About four years ago this pastor passed on to his eternal reward, well along his in years above the age of 90! With the life

that he lived for Christ and with Christ, and the lives he influenced, I know his reward in heaven will be substantial.






