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PASTOR'S MESSAGE

"Amazing grace – how sweet the sound – that saved a wretch like me! I once was lost but now am found, was blind but now I see!." *Lutheran Service Book*, Hymn 744, "Amazing Grace", stanzas 1.

As Lutheran Christians, we speak a great deal about "grace." It is one of the three *Sola*'s – along with Faith and Scripture – that are considered by many to be hallmarks of Lutheran theology. In just our hymnal, *Lutheran Service Book*, the word is used: in the title of ten hymns; in the text of 243 hymns; 176 times in our prayers; 62 times in our liturgies; 28 times in our Scripture readings; and 46 times in our Propers. The word "grace" occurs countless times in our preaching and our teaching every Sunday, and that's just in Lutheran Churches, to say nothing of the other Christian denominations across the globe.

We talk about grace so much, say it so many times, hear it so often, that we run the risk of forgetting exactly what "grace" is (and, no, Miss Muller and Miss Wilde, I am not talking about your first name). When talking about what grace is and what it means with the students in Confirmation class, I will frequently use the letters of the word as an acronym, G-R-A-C-E, God's Riches At Christ's Expense, to try and make the concept a little less hard to understand. Out of His great love for us, God the Father forgives all our sins because Jesus Christ paid the penalty for us; God richly and freely pours out His blessings on all who put our faith and trust in Jesus, and we do not do anything to earn or merit his goodness toward us. Grace is truly God's riches at Christ's expense.

Still, we say it so often and we receive it so freely that we tend to treat God's grace as though it is cheap; it reality, however, God's grace is so very, very expensive. The high price of God's grace - your forgiveness and mine - isn't paid by us, but by Christ. It cost Him His heavenly

throne, which He gave up for you and me, requiring Him to go from being the omnipotent, omnipresent God to being the newborn son of the Virgin Mary, who needed to be fed, burped, and have His diaper changed. It cost Him 33 years of toil and hardship on this earth, as He lived by the sweat of His brow and was absolutely perfect in every way, to make up for the fact that we don't and can't do it.

God's grace, given freely to you and me, cost Jesus: three years of constant travel, with no permanent place to lay His head; three years of sleepless nights as he healed the sick and the lame and the blind; three years of disciples who did not listen to Him, crowds that just wanted to be fed and entertained by Him, and religious leaders that doubted Him and wanted to kill Him. In the end, it cost Him His family and friends as they all abandoned Him and denied Him. Lastly, God's grace cost Jesus His very life, as He was nearly beaten to death by the Romans, forced to carry his cross out of the city, and then suffocated to death in excruciating agony as He hung there for 6 hour. Even God the Father had abandoned Christ as He hung on the cross, and there Jesus had suffered the agony of hell itself.

We say the word "grace" so often and so easily that it seems cheap, but it is not; God's grace is so very expensive and so very precious, but He loves you so much that He gives it to you absolutely free. It is yours as His gift. His faith is yours, His forgiveness is yours, and His strength to hold on to it is yours – all as a gift. That is how valuable and how special you are to God; He gives you His very costly grace as a free gift.

Our world often treats so may people as if they have no value or worth. It does it to old (Continued on page 5)

SUNDAY SCHOOL NEWS...


Thank you to all who attended the "God's Amazing Love" Sunday School family event on February 18, 2023. Look for another event in mid to late spring.

Please join us as we explore God's Word for all ages this school year.



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NEWS FROM OUR STEWARDSHIP DEACON...

The CLC website contains a giving page, which provides website visitors an opportunity to make a financial contribution to CLC. This functionality has many use cases. For example, if a distant friend or relative wanted to give a gift in honor of a special occasion, this is a simple, safe way to contribute. Additionally, there may be times a CLC member may want to take advantage of this convenience. This online giving capability was added during the pandemic.

It should be noted that there is a small transaction fee associated with credit card processing for this functionality. This month, Steve Feero, our webmaster, added an enhancement which the finance committee had requested, namely adding a 3% processing fee to online contributions, to help offset our costs.

Other ways of contributing include submitting an offering in person during Sunday Services, mailing via USPS, payments via your Bank portal or mobile app, or by dropping off at the Church office.

Smart Stewardship - Donating IRA Funds to Charities, including CLC Submitted by Bill Sherman

Generally, distributions from traditional Individual Retirement Arrangements (IRAs) are included in taxable income in the year they are received. One exception from such distributions being taxable is for individuals who are at least age 70½, who may directly transfer otherwise taxable traditional IRA distributions to certain tax-exempt charities. These distributions are referred to as qualified charitable distributions (QCDs). Since 2019, individuals who are at least age 72 have been subject to IRA required minimum distribution (RMD) rules. As of January 1, 2023, taxpayers who have not attained age 72 as of January 1, 2023 will need to begin their RMDs at age 73. A QCD can count as a distribution for purposes of the RMD rules.

For income tax purposes, QCDs are excluded from federal gross income, thereby saving federal and Connecticut income taxes. And because QCDs are excluded from the donor's income, QCDs also lower the odds that one will be affected by various other unfavorable income-based tax provisions, such as the amount of Social Security benefits subject to income tax, and a lower gross income can reduce certain individual's obligation to pay a greater monthly Medicare premium in a following year.

As with many income tax provisions, limitations exist. The maximum annual exclusion for QCDs is \$100,000 per person and no charitable itemized deduction is allowed for QCDs. If an individual makes deductible IRA contributions after age 70½, the amount of the QCD that may be excluded from income is reduced.

For additional information, please consult with your personal tax advisor or refer to Internal Revenue Service Publication 590-B, Distributions from Individual Retirement Arrangements. If you are interested in discussing or arranging for a QCD as an offering to Cheshire Lutheran Church, please contact me, our church office, our Financial Secretary, or our Treasurer. Any QCD must be sent directly from your IRA trustee to CLC either through electronic funds transfer to CLC's bank, or by a check payable to Cheshire Lutheran Church and mailed to our P.O. Box 157.

GETTING TO KNOW OUR MEMBERS...

CLC's featured members for March 2023 are Priscilla and Trum Troemel. Let's begin with a little-known fact: Trum, who hails from Torrington, was given the name Clarence at birth. Trum is a nickname, derived from his last name, which he has been known for most of his life. Priscilla Smith, who was born in Lansdowne, Pennsylvania, was raised in Litchfield. Priscilla met Trum at the age of 13. They met on Halloween night in front of Trum's grandmother's house, and thus began their lifelong journey.

This journey started a bit rocky at first with both families opposing the young couple's connection, but they managed to date on and off for years despite the objections. One thing that tied this pair together was their association with the Luther League. This was a Lutheran youth group that hosted meetings, get-togethers, dances, and religious lessons on Sundays. Priscilla, who is a classically trained pianist, played the organ at Luther League events.

Following high school, Trum headed to Newark College in New Jersey (NJ) to pursue engineering studies while Priscilla attended Stamford Hospital School of Nursing. Trum was enthralled with electronics and began his career working as an engineer for Bell Telephone Labs in NJ. Sadly, Priscilla's nursing school was cut short when she dropped out after her first year due to a tragic event that framed her life story. One of her two sisters was



murdered in Hartford in a senseless crime that was never solved. Priscilla's father was working as the International Financial Vice President for Ingersol Rand, which had a sizeable impact on the family. In addition, he served as the president of Charlotte Hungerford Hospital. Even though he advised the hospital not to hire her because of the tragedy they were dealing with, they found Priscilla "too interesting not to hire" so she began her career working there. She later took an administrative position with Pitney Bowes in Stamford.

Priscilla and Trum were married at St. Michael's Episcopal Church in Litchfield in 1962. Neither family was very happy about the marriage, so Priscilla shook things up a bit by rushing for an emergency appendectomy right before the wedding! All went well and the newlyweds began their life together in NJ where Trum was working for Bell Labs and Priscilla worked for Allstate Insurance. During these first years in New Jersey, the Troemels were blessed with two beautiful children. First came their son, Scott, who was followed by their daughter, Debbie.

Wanting to move back to Connecticut, Trum accepted a job with the Southern New England Telephone (SNET) company, where he worked for the next 26 years. The family settled in North Branford for the first two years before deciding to move to Cheshire in 1972 to put the kids into our renowned school system. While in North Branford, they belonged to a Congregational Church where Priscilla played the organ. The church was so close to home that when she finished practice for the day, she would sound the electronic chimes as a signal to Trum that she was finished and heading home. During this time, Priscilla worked for Aetna and had a staff reporting to her. In the '80s, she suffered a heart attack as she states, "before it was in vogue for women" to do so. After her recovery, she went to work for the Cheshire Convalescent Center.

Once in Cheshire, the Troemels discovered Cheshire Lutheran Church and it felt like home. They joined and have been members ever since. Trum faithfully served our church as an usher for many years and as a Trustee (now known as the House and Grounds committee) for over six years. He enjoyed many spring cleanups, painting parties, and providing support for all sorts of church maintenance projects. Priscilla was very involved with the Cheshire Food Drive where she camped out on the town green in the fall. Further, her love of music kept her working musically with children.

Priscilla feels blessed with the gift of music; her talents have driven much of her life. She was one of the founding members of the Cheshire Community Chorus. After suffering a second heart attack, she was motivated to fulfill her dream of forming an all -auditioned singing group called the Harmonia Choral Society. The group was staffed with Yale music students and grad students who performed at CLC along with other churches and local venues for over ten years. She later organized a choral group at the Cheshire Convalescent Center and was very immersed in the theater too. She served as Assistant Director and Stage Manager, as well as performed for the Cheshire Theater, and later branched into dinner theater. Priscilla has always been very involved and busy, busy, busy. Trum states that she "not only burned the candle at both ends, but she burned it in the

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middle too." She attributes learning her multi-tasking ability to watching her father juggle two very prominent positions simultaneously.

Trum feels that his gift from God is his tremendous knack for fixing all things electronic. After his years of engineering with the telephone companies, he worked for ten years for Comcast cable company. He constantly repaired all kinds of radios, amplifiers, and other electrical devices. He even ran a little repair shop out of his basement called Troemel's Vintage Radio and Amplifier Repair where he fixed things "just for love, not for money." His penchant for electronics even earned him four published articles in the '60s in Popular Electronics magazine...and a patent! When Bell Labs required an inexpensive remote reading thermometer, Trum created one and they registered the patent in his name. (Fun Fact: while Trum was composing tech articles for Popular Electronics, they extended an offer to Priscilla to pose for their magazine cover – an offer she jokingly refused.) Trum enjoys reading tech manuals, science publications, and science fiction and loves to tinker with electronics for fun. He considers himself a "true techy, through and through."

The Troemel's son, Scott, followed Dad's techy path for a while working initially with SNET company and now working for Frontier Communications in Fort Wayne, Indiana. He has two sons, a daughter, and a granddaughter. Priscilla and Trum's daughter, Debbie, works in Customer Service and lives in Rocky Hill, Connecticut. She has two sons, a granddaughter, and a new grandbaby on the way. Priscilla and Trum are extremely proud of their family's accomplishments and love every chance they get to spend with them.


Priscilla loved to travel, while Trum preferred staying home with the kids. This made for the perfect match. She went to Europe several times, once on a performing tour with the Waterbury Chorale. Vienna was her favorite place to visit. Because of her musical background, she fantasized about playing waltzes one day in Vienna, and this trip allowed her to realize her vision. Another memorable trip was one where they took the kids to Disney when they were little and the family had a blast camping out at Fort Wilderness.

As for musical interest, Priscilla favors classical while Trum is more of a 50's rock and roll fan. Although the pair recently enjoyed watching the super bowl, would you believe that Priscilla is more of a football fan? The kids joked that their mom loved watching Sunday football instead of their dad. Just as Trum dabbled in writing with his electronics articles, Priscilla once took a writing course and, being a lifelong cat-lover, she imagines writing a book about the similarities between cats and engineers. Sounds like a fun read!

Trum and Priscilla are grateful to God for their health (especially after her triple bypass surgery eight years ago), their family, and their countless blessings. They are especially thankful for each other and consider their crowning glory to be the fact that they are about to celebrate their 61st wedding anniversary, despite the naysayers predicting they would only last a month.


For upcoming activities, I will be working with the Youth on dates that work for more of the kids and, as I mentioned above, I'd like to make Easter candies between now and Easter.



THE RIPPEL REPORT—FEBRUARY 2023..



Unforgettable...– Follow-up Article 3

First, a correction from last months *Ripple Report* article. Fourth paragraph from the bottom (see graphic below):

My father, a Catholic wed in a Baptist Church, was labeled as someone to be shunned as an outsider. As one who married <u>"outside the race</u>" of Catholicism. I look back at all our family history and sadly say that very few members of or entire family were "churchgoers" or active in any denomination or Parish.

The word RACE should have been RAIL. This phrase "Outside the Rail" in Catholicism refers to being banned from normal worship and sacraments in worship services. To redeem oneself, a member had to renounce and recant the offence in order to return to good standing. My parents offence was marriage vows in a Protestant church not Catholic. My father never renounced nor returned to Catholicism.

Before I begin this month's narrative, I wish to state what a sincere honor and privilege it is to write this series of articles for the Heavenly Herald. At the risk of "blowing my own horn" or bragging, I have 40 plus years of experiences writing articles for both Immanuel Oxford and Trinity Shelton monthly newsletters also.

I extend my appreciation to all members who have spoken to me with their thanks and compli (Continued on page 13)

ments. For the last 2 years, since the loss of my beloved wife of 63 years, my vision has been greatly impaired by macular degeneration. However, thankfully, due to professional help, there is a light I can see at the end of the tunnel, slow improvements. I realize how difficult it must be deciphering my handwriting for all these articles so a sincere thank you to Beth for her patience and skills.

Follow-up Article 3

In the Charles Dickens classic novel "A Tale of Two Cities" he would write the opening lines regarding the chaos of the 10 year period of the French Revolution. The 10 plus years of our nations Great Depression can be viewed as a parallel event. Living and experiencing these events firsthand with my parents, profound memories are seared forever in my recollections and memories. Further, they also are part of my life story so documented and recorded. Should Charles Dickens have lived through these tragic events he may have written instead of "these were the best of times", "these were the worst of times" he may have replaced with "these were the worst of times then misery, suffering and desperation staked our Nation".

Struggles during the "Great Depression":

As noted in the previous article my young parents, ages 22 & 21, married in 1925 with great promise and expectations of their future. Unfortunately, this was never to be a reality. I wish to mention several important side issues which I feel should be explained. The following events detail our families struggles during the "Great Depression". All are authentic, as told to my-self and my own experiences as well. I would, as a reader certainly raise the questions; "how does this writer at age 91, remember exact details, events, dates, places of neighborhoods, playmates, shops, conversations etc.?" Let me explain as much.

Our small family was tight knit. Living closely, out of necessity, frequently moving and changing schools. Around our kitchen table I was kept informed with explanations of changes and decisions that were taking place in our lives. As an 18-year-old my father passed, a broken man, due to, I believe, years of living in poverty. At this age I promised myself I would document my family's life story, which I have done. Over 7 decades, I have compiled a thick Rippel family history. Our eldest daughter, the appointed family historian, is now recording a series of tapes, covering ancestry and all matters relating to our family.

Now, back to central themes, how, when and where Our Lord reached down and planted my feet firmly on a path of Christianity. My parents first address was Courtlandt Ave. in the South Bronx. We lived in a rundown pre-1900, 5 apartment building. Next, in 1933, they moved to the Tremont area to 1691 Carter Ave.. Hard times hit our family with facing eviction for non-payment of rent, my parents "downsized" and were forced to sell, trade or pawn nearly all their possessions, keepsakes, jewelry, wedding gifts, china, silverware, and furniture. Having few items to move, our next address was Dewitt Place in rural Bronx off Gun Hill Rd. In the winter of 1938, we moved into a basement apartment, rent free, in a brick 2 story building where we were "supers" for the 6 apartments. In the spring, the owner of the building told my parents his brother and family were facing eviction and he will move his family into our apartment, and we must move out.

At a chance meeting with a stranger whose name was Eddie Hogan, a WWI veteran who was wounded in the war, he had difficulty walking, even with a cane. My father told him we were looking for a place to live. He lived all alone; his home was on nearby Sexton Place. He proposed that if we did his chores, shopping, cooking, cleaning etc., we could move in rent free. Within 2 weeks we moved in. His bungalow style home was next to the Dyer Ave. rail line. My father grew a large plot of vegetables during our stay there. Unfortunately, Logan developed serious pleurisy pneumonia and was hospitalized for a lengthy period. His family informed our family we must move again. His home was closed and sold very quickly.

In the winter of 1939, the next 2 locations we moved to would be a pair of side by side furnished rooming houses. For several months we lived in a room and a half at both 3313 and 3311 Seymour Avenue. These furnished rooms were as cheap as one

could get. Rents were \$1.00 per day \$8.00 weekly and \$35 monthly. We cooked in the hallway and shared bathroom privileges with others. At both addresses our family experienced constant renter's arguments, heavy drinking, fights breaking out, late night parties and police being called to restore order. This was nothing short of living in the wild west for this 7-year-old.

During 1940 our family tried to find safe affordable living arrangements without success until August of that year. We relocated to 396 East 200th St., also known as Bedford Park Blvd. This busy street was the Eastern approach to Bronx Botanical

Gardens and the Bronx Zoo. We would move to the 2nd floor over Ognibene's Italian Fruit & Vegetable Store. The owners were Robert and Fay Mendalic, a nice couple who maintained a roof garden complete with flower tables and chairs.

The neighborhood was busy with over 30 stores and shops. Many of the owners and managers were immigrants from Europe.

Their children, first born Americans, were my playmates and school friends. I remember Vinny Dourety, with Irish parents, Henry Luhrs, of German descent and delicatessen owner, George Race, Russian. There was Helen Raptis, Greek family and Marian Farber, daughter of German parents and owners of another delicatessen. Some of my playmates attended PS46 where I attended. Henry and Marian attended Grace Lutheran as well. In the 2 years since our family moved from Carter Ave to Bedford Park we had 6 different addresses and 4 different public schools.

Introduction to the Lutheran Church:

On one midweek afternoon in the 3rd week in January 1942, I was with my playmates involved in a game of Pottsy, a hop scotch sidewalk game. My mother stopped by to remind me to come upstairs before dark. Unexpectedly, Henry Luhrs asked my mother, can Sonny (my street name) come with me to Sunday School? My mother agreed and replied, "that would be nice". That simple question and reply would determine my becoming a lifelong active Christian.

Henry Luhrs age 12 and I at 10 were in the same class led by our teacher Miss Martha Villwock. My first class was set in the parish sanctuary pews because the basement, where church school sessions would normally be held was being entirely renovated. In the sanctuary, other than the free-standing altar, was a huge oil painting mounted on the front wall. This painting was a life size painting of Jesus sitting in a fisherman's boat surrounded by his disciples', with his hands outstretched announcing "From Henceforth You Will Be Fishers Of Men". This backdrop was the largest oil painting I have ever seen. It was twice as wide as the 8 foot altar and was easily 26 feet high. The bottom of the painting elevated 4 to 6 feet above the altar. To the right, another painting of Martin Luther nailing the 95 Thesis to the Wittenberg Church doors. To the right, yet another painting of St John in the full armor of Christian protection. Each of these were about 3 feet wide and 10 feet high.

Henry kept me aware of our class routines. Pastor Bucheimer would open with a welcome prayer and some announcements. Church School Superintendent would then visit each class along with Pastor checking Augsburg Published lesson materials and attendance was taken by teachers. Forms for enrollment into church school and confirmation program were sent home to be returned by parents, which was done. In my case, I was mistakenly enrolled in Confirmation Class two years early. I was confirmed in 1944 at age 12 instead of age 14 as specified. Pastor Bucheimer found this error one year later into the program. He decided to let me finish instead of having me start all over again. He reasoned and explained to us that with many home relocations, we might suddenly move away and I might never again complete Confirmation and become a Christian.

I am reminded of Pastor Bucheimer's decision each worship service I attend. In conclusion, our confirmation class experienced thorough training and Pastors blessings with the rite of "Laying of the Hands" as we knelt at the altar of Grace Lutheran. My scripture was from Revelation Chapter 2 verse 10 "Be thou faithful unto death".



Quilts of Valor

In January, we received an invitation to present a quilt to Roger Roa of Cheshire. Robert was a Marine Corporal wounded on March 12, 2012 in Helmand Province, Afghanistan. He was hit

by an improvised explosive device (IED) and was paralyzed, along with fractures to his spine, femur, and sternum. He also suffered a head injury that resulted in a traumatic brain injury (TBI). With hard work, he eventually learned to walk again. He also received a degree in National Security and now works for our government. He still suffers from chronic backaches and severe headaches. To make this day complete, he was presented with a new home by the "Homes for our Troops" organization. This was an especially emotional moment for Paula Ongley and Lis Garafalo, who were the presenters from QOV.

A funeral service and celebration of his life was held on Saturday, February 4, at 10:30 a.m. at CLC.




WE SUPPORT HOPE PREGNANCY CENTER...






