

#### Pastor's Message

"Is anyone among you suffering? Let him pray. Is anyone cheerful? Let him sing praise. Is anyone among you sick? Let him call for the elders of the church, and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord. And the prayer of faith will save the one who is sick, and the Lord will raise him up. And if he has committed sins, he will be forgiven. Therefore, confess your sins to one another and pray for one another, that you may be healed." James 5:13–16 (ESV)

There are times in life when trouble and hardship seem to be inescapable. Turn on the television, open the newspaper, check the feed from your preferred news provider the reports of tragedy and loss have led the day far too often lately. It would be hard enough to get by if the bad news was only limited to the accounts of strangers, but it's not just strangers. Friends and neighbors, loved ones and fellow parishioners are plagued with struggles and illnesses.

When faced with these situations, we want to help. We want to do something to express our care and concern for the person in need who we see before us; we want to bring relief to their hardships. Too often, however, we feel helpless; their difficulties are beyond our meager abilities, and the solutions to their problems are far out of our reach. In times like this, what is a person – what is a Christian – to do?

Pray. That's right, pray. Pray for the person in need. Pray for their loved ones. Pray for the people around them who do have the skill and ability to help with whatever the problem is. I know that it may not seem like much of a contribution in the grand scheme of things; it may feel small and futile and useless in comparison to the problem at hand, but nothing could be further from the truth.

Prayer is nothing less that talking to Almighty God, the creator of the heavens and the earth,

and He <u>hears</u> your prayers. Yes, that's right; God hears your prayers, He answers them, and He sends healing and relief to people in need. While prayer may seem feeble and weak in the face of life's troubles, prayer is actually powerful. God works miracles in response to prayer, and prayer also reassures the person in need that they are not alone or forgotten.

Prayer reminds us that we are surrounded by, and a part of, a community of people that cares for us and supports us in both the good and bad times of life. Prayer helps us to see that we are not alone; our Lord is with us, and so are our brothers and sisters in Christ. It is part of how we live together as a community.

That's why we pray as a regular part of our Sunday service, why we pray specifically for other people, lifting up to God their cares and concerns, their needs and their worries. That's why we pray for one another as part of our own personal and private devotions, holding them up to our Heavenly Father and trusting Him to bring them the aid that He knows is best for them. It's what the body of Christ does for its members.

We pray in our services for our members and friends who serve in the Armed Forces. We pray for those celebrating joyous occasions, like new births and baptisms, confirmations and weddings, birthdays and baptismal anniversaries and wedding anniversaries. We pray for people who are sick or dying or grieving. We pray for people in the silence of our hearts, lifting up people in need and adding their names to the list laid before the Lord.

We pray because the Lord tells us to pray, because He hears, and because He <u>does</u> answer. We pray because it makes a

#### NEWS FROM THE PRESIDENT

AND THE CHURCH COUNCIL Greetings All

I hope all of you had a great summer, are doing well and are looking forward to the autumn season.

The choirs are back, Sunday School is in session and the Council is back at work. We had our first Council and Voters meetings. In our September council meeting, the first draft of the 2026 Mission Plan was presented by Randy Raddatz, our Parish Vice-President, and was approved by the Council to be presented to the Voters at the September Voters meeting. The final plan will be brought to the Voters in November for final approval, after adjustments, if any, are made.

Another issue of great importance that was discussed at both meetings is the formation of our Nominating Committee, as per our Constitution and Bylaws. This committee consists of two deacons and one voter. At the time of this writing the committee consists of Rob Delaubell, David Schrumm and Jeff Mann. We have several vacancies to fill. They are Financial Secretary, Stewardship Deacon, Fellowship Deacon, Youth Deacon and Worship Deacon. If anyone feels compelled to take on one of these roles, please reach out to the Nominating Committee. You will never serve alone. There are always members willing to help. 1 Timothy 3:1 reads, "This saying is trustworthy: If anyone aspires to the office of overseer, he desires a noble task."

Also at both meetings, the House and Grounds committee sought the approval of additional funds to allocated for repairs on the Parsonage. The repairs include the replacement of the deck, patio and sidewalk. This was approved and the work will be in progress soon.

Our next Council meeting will take place on Tuesday, October 21st, and the next Voters meeting will be Sunday, November 9th. As always, if you have any questions or concerns, please don't hesitate to reach out to any member of our Church Council. We're here to listen, support, and walk alongside you in Christ's love.



#### MEMORIAL GARDEN & COLUMBARIUM NEWS...

#### Columbarium Committee Update:

The Columbarium Committee continues careful planning and stewardship of our church's sacred memorial space. With deep respect for those who have gone before us and a commitment to serving our congregation's future needs, the committee reviewed several key items and made meaningful progress.

#### Highlights:

- Site Maintenance & Aesthetics: The Committee discussed ongoing care of the Columbarium grounds, including seasonal upkeep and potential enhancements to the landscaping. The goal is to ensure the space remains peaceful, dignified, and welcoming year-round.
- **Plaque and Niche Management:** The Committee is working to streamline the process for families and ensure timely communication and coordination with vendors.
- Policy Review & Documentation: We are revisiting the Columbarium policies to ensure clarity and consistency. A few updates were proposed to better reflect current practices and to make the guidelines more accessible to families considering future arrangements.
- Financial Oversight: The Committee reviewed the Columbarium fund and discussed long-term sustainability. Stewardship of these resources remains a top priority, with transparency and care guiding all decisions.

**Outreach and Education:** Plans are underway to provide more information to the Congregation about the Columbarium's purpose, availability, and spiritual significance. The Committee hopes to host an informational session later this fall.




**ELP WANTED**

As our fall holidays approach, I would again like to bake, assemble a small gift and visit those who remain shut in! Can you be part of this outreach?



#### WELLNESS & SAFETY COMMITTEE NEWS...



#### **WELLNESS & SAFETY – FIRE PREVENTION**

In 1922, the second week of October was named "Fire Prevention Week" by the *National Fire Protection Association* (NFPA). Today, October is observed as "Fire Prevention Month" which serves as a reminder to take preventative measures, practice fire escape planning, and ensure homes are equipped with essential fire safety tools like working smoke alarms and fire extinguishers. It's important for all of us to take some time and be prepared.

#### FIRE SAFETY TIPS AT HOME



- 1. Make sure you have working smoke alarms in your home one for every level. Remember to check all of them every month and to change the batteries regularly. For added safety, you can get units that are both smoke and carbon monoxide alarms.
- 2. Avoid electrical fires by unplugging appliances when not in use and do not overload outlets by plugging in too many devices with things like power strips. When using an extension cord, make sure it is thicker than the cord for the device you are plugging in and do not put electrical wires under rugs or in high traffic areas.
- 3. Consider getting at least one fire extinguisher for your home. More fires start in the kitchen that in any other room, so this would be a good place to have one. Remember to get a fire extinguisher that is designed to

work on the most common types of home fires.

- 4. Clean the lint trap of your clothes dryer regularly and clear out any lint under or behind the dryer twice a year. Fires in residential areas often start in the clothes dryer.
- 5. Have an escape plan for how you will get out of your home if there is ever a fire. Make sure the members of your family know it. Don't forget to designate a place outside of the home and far enough away where everyone will gather to make sure they are safe.



#### WELLNESS & SAFETY – SAFE TRICK-OR-TREATING

Every October 31, children across the nation enjoy going out to trick-or-treat. From shortly after school, when the Elementary and Preschool children head out, to the evening when the teenagers make their rounds, Halloween is a time when the sidewalks and streets of our communities are filled with young people having fun. In the midst of the excitement, it's important to take some simple steps to make sure everyone has a safe time.

#### TRICK-OR-TREATER SAFETY TIPS

- 1. Young children should always be accompanied by an adult on their neighborhood rounds.
- 2. If older children are going without an adult, they should travel in groups and remember to plan and review an acceptable route before they go out..
- 3. Agree on a specific time children should be home.
- 4. Remind children never to enter a stranger's home or car.
- 5. Tell your children not to eat any treats until they get home, so a responsible adult can check it for safety and food allergies.

#### **HALLOWEEN DRIVER SAFETY TIPS**

1. Watch for children walking on roadways, medians, and curbs.

- 2. Enter and exit driveways and alleys carefully.
- 3. At dusk and after it gets dark watch for children in dark clothing/costumes.
- 4. Discourage new and/or inexperienced drivers from driving on Halloween.

#### **HOMEOWNER SAFETY TIPS**

- Keep your porch and front yard clear of tripping hazards like garden hoses, toys, and bikes.
- 2. Sweep leaves from sidewalks and steps to prevent people slipping.
- 3. Turn on exterior lights (front door, garage, etc.) that illuminate where trick-or-treaters will walk.
- 4. Do not leave candy out unattended or unmonitored. You have a responsibility to make sure the candy people get from your house is safe and that no one tampers with it.
- 5. If you are not giving out candy, remember to turn off your front porch light and consider turning off any lights that might illuminate your front door from the inside.

This year our lessons for grades Pre-K (ages 4-5) – Grade 6, are an overview of the Old Testament. Toddlers and parents have a different lesson set up that uses both New and Old Testament lessons throughout the year. - We will have a regular lesson on December 21, 2025, and we will be off for December 28, 2025, for Christmas and New Year's.





## GIVING TO CLC THROUGH YOUR IRA: A SMART WAY TO SHARE...

If you're age 73 or older, the IRS requires you to take annual withdrawals from your traditional IRA—these are called **Required Minimum Distributions (RMDs)**. The amount is based on your account balance at the end of the previous year and your life expectancy. For example, at age 73, the IRS Uniform Lifetime Table uses a factor of 26.5, which means your RMD is approximately 3.77% of your IRA balance.

These distributions are **taxable income**. However, if you'd like to support CLC, there's a way to do so while reducing your tax bill: the **Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD)**.

A QCD allows you to contribute directly from your IRA to CLC. This amount can count toward your RMD and is **excluded from your taxable income**. How to Make a QCD:

- Contact your IRA provider and request a **direct transfer** to CLC. You'll likely need to complete a form or initiate the request online.
- The payment must be made **directly to CLC**, not to you.
- When you file your taxes, the amount you donated directly from your IRA as a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) doesn't count as taxable income.

**Please contact a member of the CLC Finance Committee** if you have any questions or plan to make a QCD. This helps us track and acknowledge your gift appropriately.

By using a QCD, you not only support a cause you care about—you also reduce your taxable income, making it a win-win for CLC and your finances!
